FOR SULTAN'S RELIEF

His Highness Becoming Anxious **Over Revolutionary Movement and** Advisors Plan Diversion.

PARIS, April 14 .- The Memorial Diplomatique says it has learned that the illness of the Sultan of Turkey is rapidly becoming worse and that he is most anxious concerning the revolutionary movement in Asia Minor. His advisers see only one hope, and that is to provide an exterior diversion in the form of a war with Bul-

garia. Trouble with this country would be already broken out, but for the sulform the disturbing element. The older tan's fear that the Eulgarians who are rapid mobilizers would win the first success and that this would be followed by an insurrection thruout the whole of Asia Minor.
