New York, April 29.—The new Cunard steamer Campania which arrived Saturday from Liverpool is the largest passenger vessel affoat, her dimensions being; Length over all 625 feet, breadth 65 feet, depth 41 feet. Her measurement is nearly 13,000 tons. The engines are said to be the most powerful and perfect of the kind eyer constructed, developing at least 25,000 horse power by steam generated from 13 bollers heated by 100 furnaces.

The masts and funnels rake at the same angle, giving the vessel a yacht-like appearance. The two funnels are each 26 feet in diameter, and an idea of their immense size may be realized when it is said that more than 20 people took lunch in one of the sections when it was lying in the shipyard on the Clyde.
