Two Hundred Persons Composed the Delegation—The Privy Council Judgment Severely Decried as the Powers of the Province to Prohibit the Manufacture of Liquor—Mr. Hardy Desires Some Time to Study the Judgment.

Yesterday afternoon a deputation of about 200 members of the Dominion Alliance, now in session in Toronto, waited upon the Ontario Government.

The deputation was headed by Mr. Hardy and his colleagues should announce their position on the temperance question.
