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DEPREDACTIONS BY TOUAREGS.

European Expedition Attacked in the Sahara and One Hundred Men Killed. Algiers, March 22.—Telegram Algiers announces that a number of Arabs arrived at Ghardela yesterday and that they were raiding the country. Ghardela is situated about 300 miles south of Algiers, in the Sahara. It is further announced that a party of Touaregs recently attacked a European expedition which was on its way to Air, in the Sahara, and that after a fierce fight the Touaregs were beaten off, but the expedition lost one hundred men killed and part of its caravan was captured.

LYING REPORT CONTRADICTED.

Canadian Mail Carriers Have Not Refused to Handle United States Letters. San Francisco, March 22.—The report from Skagway that tons of mail are being lost or destroyed at that place and that Canadian mail carriers refuse to handle the letters unless they bear Canadian postage, is emphatically denied by assistant superintendent Harry Lewis of the railway mail service. He admits that a large amount of mail accumulated at Skagway during the winter months, and it was impossible to get it over the summit in February.

HOODLUMS PUNISHED.

Were Disturbers of the Peace and Offended Citizens. Charles Pettit, James McCully and Isaac Porter were convicted in the Police Court yesterday of creating disturbances at the corner of Adelaide and John-streets. Porter and McCully were sentenced to jail for 30 days each, and Pettit, the ringleader of the gang, got four months in the Central Prison. Robert Murray was charged with the theft of three Daylight gas fixtures, and remanded until trial.

RESULT OF CARELESSNESS.

That is the Discovery Regarding the Toulon Explosion. Paris, March 22.—According to an official statement regarding the explosion last evening in a laboratory attached to the War Ministry, it occurred in the course of experiments in mixing gases intended to light railway cars. Another cause was it was due to experiments made for the purpose of ascertaining the cause of the Toulon and Bourges explosions by mixing different kinds of powders and that it shows that the Toulon catastrophe was the result of carelessness. Seven persons were injured, three of them seriously, by last night's explosion.

News of the Boats.

The old steamer Burydice, which has been bought by the Kingston wrecking company, will be ready in a couple of weeks to take into commission as a wrecking steamer. She leaves here at the foot of Church-street the 1st of April. Capt. Goodwin expects to be able to continue his trips to the Island in the Adeline today. W. K. Murphy of the steamer A. J. Tyson is busy making arrangements for the coming season. The steamer will be repaired and overhauled before she starts out.

Local Exports of a Day.

A consignment of furs valued at \$1000 was yesterday shipped to the United States by local firms. Other exports from the port of Toronto were: Cattle, at \$60,000; clover seed, at \$2000; and sheep at \$2000; Germany and wheat at \$3000; and clover seed at \$1400 to Belgium.

Camden Gets Full Power.

Madrid, March 22.—The Queen Regent has signed the decree giving M. Jules Cambon, the French Ambassador at Washington, full power to represent Spain at the exchange of the ratifications of the treaty of peace with the United States.

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WILL IT BE A LABEL SUIT?

Dunn's Solicitors Ask Denison to Re-tract His Statement or Be Sued in Court.

NEW BUILDINGS ARE WANTED
