

Boulder Creek. Vancouver, B.C., May 3.—News of a clash between the whites and Indians on the trail to Klukwan and Boulder Creek was reported by the steamer Danube, which arrived yesterday. The party attacked was the Haines Trail Committee. J. D. Sheldon, the chairman, arrived at Skaguay last

The committee had raised funds, located camps and started in to open a summer trail up to Klukwan and thence up Boulder Creek. Everything moved all right until the native bucks took exception to the intrusion of the white men and started in, about 200 strong, all armed, to clean out the workers. The laborers were driven into the mission, and set about organizing for resistance. Fifty of the hot heads armed intenselves and wanted to go out immediately, but they were prevailed upon by the cooler residents to delay, and in the meantime Mr. Sheldon went to Skaguay to see the authorities.
