GLOOMY SPECTACLE. London, Oct. 23 .- A Madrid dispatch to the Standard says: "The Queen Regent presided at a council of ministers today. Senator Canovas, the Premier, gave a complete sketch, which was gloomy enough, of home

and colonial affairs. "The loss of men in the colonial wars has proved disastrous to husbandry, as proved by the marked decrease in export. Spain will be compelled to largely import breadstuffs. Only patriotism prevents the latent discontent from breaking out. A presentiment impels the nation to show cohesion and a haughty determination with a view to avoiding international complications, and the possible intervention of the United States."

The gloomiest feature of the situation the Prime Minister dreaded is the difficulty which the Government finds in obtaining a loan of 1,000,000,000 pesetas to defray the expenses of the war in Cuba and the Philippine Islands, and to strengthen the finance of the country.

# GONE DOWN.

Wreck of a Missionery Vessel - Nine Persons Missing.

London, Oct. 23 .- The missionary vessel Day Spring has been wrecked on the Island of New Caledonia. There were seventeen persons on board her, eight of whom were saved. The fate of the others is unknown, and it is feared they have perished.

# MRS. CASTLE CONFESSES.

Admits Taking the Things She Is Ac-

cused of Having Stolen. London, Oct. 23 .- Mr. Lewis Weill, a watch manufacturer, of Hatton of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Castle, of San Francisco, now at liberty under £40,000 bail, pending their trial on November 2, upon charges of shoplifting, said to a representative of the United Associated Press: "Dr. George Henry Savage, one of the leading English experts in mental diseases, who examined Mrs. Castle for four hours, is prepared to swear that she is not responsible. In the course of Dr. Savage's conversation with her Mrs. Castle confessed that she had taken the things she is accused of having stolen, but she could not tell why she did so."

London, Oct. 23 .- The Marquis of Salisbury has demanded the immediate release of Sun-Yat-Sen, the Chinese ject, who, according to the statement of his friends, was kidnapped while passing the Chinese Legation here, and held a prisoner on the charge of having been engaged in a conspiracy to overthrow the Manchu dynasty. Sir Halliday McArtney, counsellor of Chinese Legation, denies that the man was kidnapped on the street. McArtney claimed that he was caught spying at the legation. Sun-Yat Sen (the name of the prisoner) pra ticed as a physician in the Un

### December Option Dropped Five Cents-The Decline is Universal.

Chicago, Oct. 23.-About 5 cents a bushel was clipped off the price of wheat yesterday. December, which closed on Wednesday at 75 1-4c finished yesterday at 70 1-2c. It is not often that the price was such a sensationally sudden collapse. Stop-loss orders were in the hands of every commission man who had customers long of wheat, and when a decline came early in the day it caught the most of them. It was practially impossible to follow exactly the stoploss orders at any given figure, and

the result was an almost unanimous rush to sell. The closing fifteen minutes on Change were marked by scenes of almost unparalleled excitement. In that brief period the price of December option, which had been tumbling around 73 1-4c to 73 3-8c in an uncertain fashion for some time, fell to 70 1-4c, the low point of the day. Most of the late decline occurrred in a space of five minutes.
