HOLDS BOYS BEFORE TRAIN

A Texas Father Commits a Terrible Crime While Intoxicated.

Trinidad, Col., Nov. 9. - A tragedy was enacted three miles out of Childress, Tex., on the Colorado and Southern Railway, which shows the depravity to which strong drink will lead a human being.

Two little boys, scarcely more than babes, were deliberately held in front of a passenger train by their father, who stood in the center of the track and calmly awaited death.

The man's name is C. A. Carham The train was late into Childress, and was running at a high rate of speed to make up lost time, when three miles out, as the engine rounded a sharp curve, the engineer saw a man and two little boys standing on the track.
