# TAUGHT A LESSON

A Charivari Suit in Which Each Party Pays Costs.

Barrie, Oct. 29.-Chief Justice Meredith had his patience exercised with a jury whom he had to send to their room three times before they brought in a verdict that his lordship could receive.
