AGED LONDONER DEAD

Mr. Patrick Phillips, of Grey Street, Passes Suddenly Away.

Mr. Patrick Phillips, one of the best known of old-time railway men in London, died at his residence, 498 Grey street, yesterday afternoon.

The deceased, who was in his 77th year, passed away suddenly. A couple of years ago he was seized with a paralytic stroke, but he almost fully recovered from the effects of it. Yesterday morning, while working in the garden about 7 o'clock, he was again stricken. He never rallied and died at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

The late Mr. Phillips was a native of Durand, County Wicklow, Ireland. He came to Canada when quite young and for over 50 years resided in London. For over 40 years he was a section foreman on the London and Port Stanley Railway, only retiring about five years ago. He worked on the construction of the above-named road. A short time ago a daughter, Mrs. Yeo, died and this event undoubtedly affected the health of her father.

The deceased was a member of the Church of England and was a Conservative in politics. He is survived by a widow, three daughters and three sons, as follows: Mrs. W. J. Stewart and Mrs. O. G. Bayley, of this city, and Miss Libby Phillips, at home; William and Percy, of this city, and John, of Lima, Ohio.

The funeral, to Woodland Cemetery, will take place tomorrow afternoon. Rev. Dyson Hague will conduct the services.

THE LATE MRS. ANDERSON.

There died on the evening of July 5, at her residence, Grange street, Stratford, Sarah M., beloved wife of Wm. Anderson. Deceased, whose maiden name was Webb, was born at St. James, West Nisour, 34 years ago. At the age of 21, she was married to Wm. Anderson, of St. Marys. The following year she was baptized and joined the latter day saints' church, of which she remained a consistent member until death. Besides her husband she leaves a mother, five sisters and four brothers. They are: Mrs. C. Bowley, Mr. Brydges, Mrs. B. Lawson, Crumlin, Moffat M. St. Thomas; James H. London, and Walter, Melvin, Hamilton, and Verda at the material home. During her life the last three years of which she spent in Stratford, Mrs. Anderson made many friends, as shown by their floral offerings. Among these was a beautiful wreath from the husband, a pillar of roses from the employer, a cross from the family; a wreath from Mr. Greenwood; one from Rev. Mr. Gregory; one from the I. O. F. lodge, of which Mr. Anderson was a member; bouquets from many other friends. The funeral services were conducted at the family residence, 15, preacher's text being Psalm cxvii, 15. A large number of sorrowing friends followed the remains to the St. Marys Cemetery. The pallbearers were four brothers of deceased. Much sympathy is felt for the family as the father was called away just four months ago.

WEALTH A MILLSTONE

Declares Acquisition of Millions Does Not Bring Happiness to Man.

Chicago, July 11.—"No one in easy financial circumstances could conscientiously consider John D. Rockefeller's money as anything but a millstone about his neck," said William Kent yesterday in an address on "Opportunity" at Lincoln Center.

"Great wealth cannot be called opportunity. It isolates a man, and if he is conscientious it imposes upon him a terrific burden. Marshall Field, leaving his millions to his grandchildren, left them far happier than if he had left them penniless. It is such a heritage as Carl Schurz left that counts."

"The competitive system, as an economic scheme, has proved itself absolutely incompetent. Such a poem as that of Senator Ingalls on 'Opportunity' might have been written by Machiavelli, or Napoleon, or a safe-blower. It is the safe-blower's view of opportunity, and it is this view of opportunity which makes trucking necessary."

"For, in spite of its proven incompetence, the competitive system persists, and is lending itself to the destruction of humanity. In the packing houses it has, with its eye to profit and sale, driven labor to despair and has become usually laid to combination. It is this doctrine of non-interference which has produced the horrors of child labor and other things which make our civilization a mockery."

"And yet, in our passion for curbing the trust we try to regulate commerce by forcing it back, through legislation, into this antiquated system. More foolish laws were never drawn than the Sherman act and its fellows. At the other extreme the labor movement has become a religion. It is fanatically held, often economically foolish, now altruistic and now selfish. Nevertheless, it has proven in these times an instrument of the greatest value."

HOUSE SURGEON IS REAPPOINTED

Dr. McGuffin to Continue on Hospital Staff—Fuel Contract Awarded.

At a meeting of the hospital trust held last night at 9:30 o'clock two matters of importance were brought up—the awarding of the fuel contracts and the appointment of the chief resident house surgeon.

Several tenders were received for fuel, and that of Green & Co., was accepted, it being the lowest. The class of coal to be used was left with the engineer and superintendent. Dr. Chester McGuffin was re-appointed to the position of resident chief house surgeon for another term. A letter was received from Miss Martha Lewis, thanking the hospital staff, the trust and all concerned, for the ten months' training she had been given to prepare her for missionary work in South Africa.

The superintendent's report was read and it showed that since the last meeting patients admitted were, males 56, females 66, children 33, total 155; discharged, males 61, females 72, children 35, total 168; blind 15, deaf 13, operations 60. The total receipts from

patients was \$2,119 75. Mr. Heard also reported the following contributions: From St. Matthew's Church, Sunday School, a basket of cut flowers, and from the Bible Flower Mission, weekly donations of cut flowers.

The new mangle, which has been on trial at the hospital, has been found to be entirely satisfactory, and has been accepted.
