A SUCCESSFUL YEAR
St. Matthew's Church Advances Under Rev. Wm. Lowe.

Rev. Wm. Lowe, of St. Matthew's Church, East London, celebrated his first anniversary as pastor of the church on Sunday, and he took advantage of the occasion and thanked the congregation for the encouragement given him. During the year, there have been 31 baptisms, 9 marriages, 10 burials, 19 persons confirmed, and 16 subscriptions of the holy communion; the subscriptions amounted to \$1,221.59, while for missionary purposes \$133.02 had been raised. The debt had been reduced by \$200, and interest amounting to \$150 had been paid. On Sunday the thankoffering amounted to \$52.87.

Nominated by Local Teachers' Association for Advisory Council.

Principal M. W. Althouse, of Rectory street school, was last night nominated by the London Teachers' Association as a candidate for the new advisory council to be formed by the Ontario department of education.

Candidates are being nominated in all parts of Ontario, but only four can be elected.

ANNUAL BANQUET
OF THE Y. M. C. A.
One Hundred and Twenty-Five Members and Friends Participated.

The annual banquet of the Y. M. C. A. was given last night and was thoroughly enjoyed by the 125 people who attended.

After the spread had been partaken of, President John Macpherson made a short address, in which he stated that the past year had been a most successful one and that the prospects for the coming year looked even brighter. Now that Mr. Brent had joined the staff it was stronger than it had ever been.

The Y. M. C. A. was a more popular institution than ever and was constantly reaching out and covering more territory.

Mr. Macpherson said that the industrial classes, in his opinion, would in a few years play as important a part in twentieth century life as the modern educational classes did at present.

Mr. F. H. Heath, chairman of the committee in charge of social work, said that this branch was the foundation of the Y. M. C. A. Mr. George A. Gregg, international educational secretary, who had just returned from England, was glad to be in the Forest City again. He said that the Y. M. C. A. is making great progress in Great Britain.

Mr. E. F. H. Parker, chairman of the physical culture department, said that the business men of this city did not realize the practical value of physical culture or they would do more for it.

Mr. Brent, the new physical director, was given the reception of the evening. He said that it had been stated that the present methods of living, the race would soon become extinct were it not for the infusion of fresh country blood. There was much in our modern life that needed correcting.

School children were compelled to study in poorly ventilated rooms, and many teachers were ignorant of the most simple rules of hygiene. He thought more Christianity was needed in our everyday life and that we would never reach the state of perfection until we studied God's plan in placing us on earth and then following it out.

Mr. A. L. Wickett spoke a few words on the importance of the religious work played in the Y. M. C. A.

Rev. Dyson Hague spoke of the earnest support he had always given the Y. M. C. A.

Secretary Wilson said that the Bible classes would begin on Oct. 2. More attention would be paid to this work than in the past.

NEW YORK MECCA
FOR CRIMINALS
Chicago Clergyman Compiles Interesting Statistics on This Subject.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—Chicago criminals seem to have a liking for little old New York. One-tenth of all those fugitives from Chicago justice who are overtaken and captured are arrested in New York.

Rev. Mr. Hembree, a Chicago clergyman, has been collecting information on this subject, and has prepared tables, giving the relative attractiveness of various cities to the unsavory gentry in question.

During the period covered by Rev. Mr. Hembree's figures 1,114 fugitives from justice, fleeing from the police of Chicago, were captured at outlying points.

Of these 1,114 criminals, 71 were murderers, 83 forgers and 111 embezzlers. The arrests were made in 36 states, 2 territories and 2 foreign lands, showing how small a proportion of fugitives ever reach foreign shores.

Seven-eighths of the arrests, or 729 out of 1,114 were made in six states, as follows: Missouri 175, New York 145, Illinois 117, Wisconsin 103, Michigan 99 and Indiana 90.

The 111 arrested embezzlers were run to earth in eighteen different states and one reached Europe. Of these arrests, 41 were made in five cities, namely, New York 16, Detroit 8, Milwaukee 7, Buffalo and Philadelphia 6 each.

The Chicago Tribune says that the attraction of New York for embezzlers is accounted for by the reverend criminologist, not by the premise that they were trying to get to Europe, but by the fact that New York offers a good place to spend money.

The 63 arrests for forgery were made in 17 states and 1 foreign land. Of these 63, 11 were caught in Missouri, 3 in Indiana and 3 in Michigan, the rest scattering, showing the forger to be more cunning than the embezzler as a criminal.

St. Louis, either from its geographical situation or its reputation for negligent police methods, also was chosen as the haven of a great proportion of the fleeing murderers. Of seventy-one murderers who fled thirty-one were captured in States nearby Chicago, as follows: Missouri 10, Illinois 8, Indiana 6, Michigan 4, Iowa 3. Why the criminals avoid Iowa to such an extent is not explained.

Of these seventy-one fugitive murderers thirty-two were caught in nine cities, as follows: St. Louis 8, New Orleans 5, New York 3, Cleveland 3, Minneapolis 3, St. Paul 3, Buchanan, Mich. 3, Milwaukee 2, Indianapolis 2.

The tables compiled by the Rev. Mr. Hembree appear to show that the criminal usually flees by rail, and that the destination is in proportion to the number of railway trains from Chicago to that point. It destroys the idea that the criminal is cunning in flight and affords the police a valuable table by which to guide themselves in throwing out the dragnet for fugitives.

A study of these tables shows that it is a rare thing for these city criminals to take refuge in the country. Perhaps the town bred criminal cannot bear the solitude and the restraints of country life. He prefers to hide himself in some large city where he may fraternize with his kind.
