Shortly after Confederation a boundary dispute developed between the and the Province of On-The Ontario Government and the Mackenzie Government in 1874 refer the question to arbitration. An eminent and impartial tribunal decided in favor of the Province, but the Government of Sir John A. Macdonald repudiated the solemn undertaking of its predecessor, and refused to ratify the award. Sir John comprised only 116,782 square miles. The Government of Ontario Government, and its ally, the Opposition in the Ontario Legislature. In the meantime the Dominion Government had been parceling Ontario's domain among party heelers and favorites. This statement is not partisan misrepresentation, but a matter of official record. In 1883-4 nearly a million acres of timber limits in the disputed territory were placed under license by federal orders-in-council at an average rate of \$5 per square mile, or Macdonald Government wished to deprive Ontario of this territory, and annex it to the Province of Manitoba, because Manitoba crown lands were under federal administration, while Ontario crown lands were under the control of the Ontario Government.
