This was decided at a meeting of the county county county in the city of the cil last night. The payment of the money will be made in five annual and issue of debentures without interest. "The new buildings will be fireproof," he continued, "and the main structure will have a frontage of 256 feet, with a tower to which addition can be made later with increased funds. One wing will be constructed at first, 128 feet in depth. It will accommodate about 600 pupils and will cost about \$450,000.
