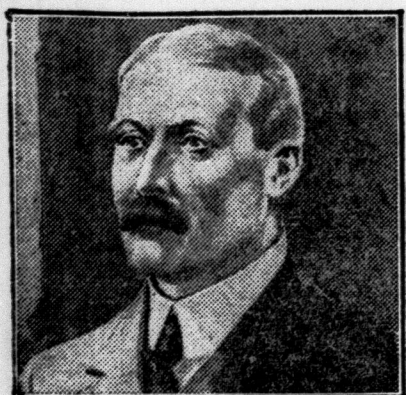

VICTORIA NEWSPAPER OWNER ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF THEFT

Griffith R. Hughes Released On Bail of \$20,000 After Police Court Hearing.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 9.—Griffith R. Hughes, proprietor of the Victoria Times, was arrested here last night on a charge of stealing \$20,000 from Messrs. David Spencer, Limited, a local departmental store. Application for bail was refused on account of the large sums alleged to be involved.

The Times will say, in part, today: "Griffith R. Hughes appeared before Magistrate Jay in police court this morning and was remanded until Tuesday morning. Mr. Hughes was released on \$20,000 bail. A plea of not guilty was entered by Mr. Hughes' attorney, H. A. MacLean.

"The warrant read in court against Mr. Hughes charged that on the 22nd day of November, 1919, in the city of Victoria, he did unlawfully steal \$20,000, the property of David Spencer, Limited, contrary to the criminal code.

"Mr. MacLean said he was tried by a jury," said Mr. MacLean. He then asked for Mr. Hughes' release on bail. Deputy Attorney General A. Johnson, K.C., prosecuting, opposed this, asserting that although the warrant against Mr. Hughes was issued on one charge, "certain other information came to us last night."

Magistrate Jay, replying, said that two other informations have already been laid.

Mr. Hughes has been for a number of years acting in financial capacity for the Spencer firm.

Taken on the Spencer staff more than fifteen years ago as an accountant and head bookkeeper, Mr. Hughes became auditor and occupied that position up to a few days ago.

A few years ago Mr. Hughes purchased the Daily Times from the estate of the late Senator Templeman.

COMMITTEE FAVORS HIRING ASSISTANT TO ARCHITECT OF BOARD

Recommend That Salary Be \$2,500 Per Year—Discuss Trip.

TO INSPECT SCHOOLS

All Nominated For International Tour—Three High School Teachers Resign.

Number three committee of the board of education Friday afternoon recommended the appointment of W. H. Robinson, a London constructional engineer now in Paris, as assistant to School Architect L. E. Carrothers, his salary to be payable at the rate of \$2,500 a year.

Mr. Carrothers was also authorized to endeavor to obtain the temporary services of an efficient office draughtsman.

The committee at some length discussed the desirability of representatives of the committee and the board of education taking a little trip of inspection to size up the latest types of collegiate institutes in Ontario, and high schools in Michigan, New York, New Jersey, Montreal and Orange, New Jersey, Detroit and Ottawa.

It was reported that London might desire to copy. Members of the committee obligingly suggested the desirability of other members going on the trip and apportioning their nominations nicely so that everybody was nominated, not forgetting Secretary McElhennan. Mrs. Ronald Harris was the only trustee who definitely declined nomination.

A committee of probably four or five members, including Architect Carrothers and Principal Mooney, will probably be appointed at a board meeting next Thursday afternoon to make the trip. Three collegiate teachers have resigned or are resigning, and because of the distribution of classes next term over several school buildings at least one additional teacher will be required.

Principal Mooney was accordingly given a free hand to secure four new teachers.

The junior years of the collegiate will be accommodated in Alexandra and Lord Roberts public schools and the higher classes in Princess avenue school, with several classes also in the old north building of the collegiate, which escaped the flames.

PARIS, July 9.—Formal official acceptance of the terms arranged by Premier Lloyd George and Leonid Krassin for the reopening of commercial relations between Soviet Russia and the British Empire has been sent by the Moscow Government to the British Government. It is learned here, an official declaration on the subject, it is understood, will shortly be made by the British Government.

TASCHEREAU IS NOW IN CHARGE OF QUEBEC GOVT.

Cabinet Is Same With One Addition—To Follow Gouin's Policy.

QUEBEC, July 9.—(Canadian Press.)—Hon. L. A. Taschereau took over the reins of Provincial Government this morning. The new premier at once chose his cabinet, which remains the same as it was before, with the addition of Hon. J. L. Perron, legislative councillor, who becomes member without portfolio.

The new cabinet was sworn this morning at 11 o'clock, and afterwards there was a short meeting of the ministers, following which the new prime minister stated that he will continue the policy of Sir Lomer Gouin.

UNITED FARMERS TO HAVE MATERIAL FOR CABINET IN FIELD

Members Profit by Experience Last October in Finding Seats.

TORONTO, July 9.—Profiting by their experience after the provincial general elections of last October in having to pick seats for men appointed to the Ontario Government, the United Farmers are arranging to put leading U. F. O. members in the field as candidates for the Dominion Parliament, so that if the United Farmers secure a majority of the seats in the House of Commons they will have an ample cabinet material already elected.

President R. W. E. Burnaby has been in the field for some time in North York, and it is said that Vice-President W. A. Ames of Palmerston will probably be a candidate, although he was defeated in the provincial election.

Harold Currie, U. F. O. director for Middlesex, and H. V. Hooper of West Hastings, also a member of the U. F. O. executive, will be candidates, it is said.

Secretary J. J. Morrison of the U. F. O. has been offered several nominations, but will not be a candidate.

U. S. DRY OFFICERS ARREST FOUR WITH CANADIAN WHISKEY

Officers Hold Up Gang At the Point of Gun—Confiscate Two Cars.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 9.—(By Canadian Press.)—United States prohibition agents today arrested four Canadians at Lewiston, N.Y., on a charge of smuggling whiskey. Joseph and Samuel Sirrianni, Frank Caroleo and Dominic Leo Cheoro are said to have been caught with two automobiles in each of which were 500 quarts of Canadian whiskey.

Federal United States agents were watching for them and jumped into the road, holding them up at the point of their revolvers. The cars were confiscated. The men were brought before the United States commissioner, Glenn Stockwell, and were released on bail of \$1,000 each.

It is believed that they entered the United States at the Lewiston bridge.

TCHICHERIN BELIEVES TRADE WITH BRITAIN MEANS ARMISTICE

Russian Minister Expects Way Paved For Peace.

LONDON, July 9.—The text of a note sent by M. Tchicherin, Russian Bolshevik foreign minister, accepting the principles laid down in the London memorandum, transmitted July 2, by

The British Government to M. Krassin, as the basis of agreement between Russia and Great Britain, is given in a dispatch to the Herald from Christiania.

The note sets forth the Soviet Government's belief that "the plan proposed will have to be considered as an armistice between Russia and Great Britain, and shares the British Government's expectation that this armistice will pave the way to definite peace."

COL. COLES RESIGNS AS G. W. V. A. HEAD

His Leaving Office Regretted by Executive Committee—Controversy Causes Action.

At the last executive meeting of the year of the G. W. V. A. last evening at the Masonic Temple, a vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring president, Col. W. G. Coles. His resignation was handed into the committee's hands last week because of a controversy with a fellow-member regarding former C.E.P. officers who were at the head of the organization. His resignation was accepted with regret.

Word was received from the Baptist Church rebuilding fund, saying that Rev. A. C. Eingham will be out of town for the concert that was to have been given in Queen's Park on Sunday evening in aid of the building fund. It was decided that the concert will be given as arranged, and the proceeds will go to aid the G. W. V. A. war memorial fund. This concert will be the first of a series given by the band for the east end citizens.

BOYCOTT PUBLICATIONS. TORONTO, July 9.—A resolution to boycott the Hearst publications and to take steps to encourage the support of all Canadian and British standard periodicals by the members of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire was passed at a meeting of the national executive of the Daughters of the Empire here today. Indorsement was given a petition from the Calgary branch of the Canadian Women's Press Club to the Government to conserve the supply of pulpwood for newsprint in Canada.

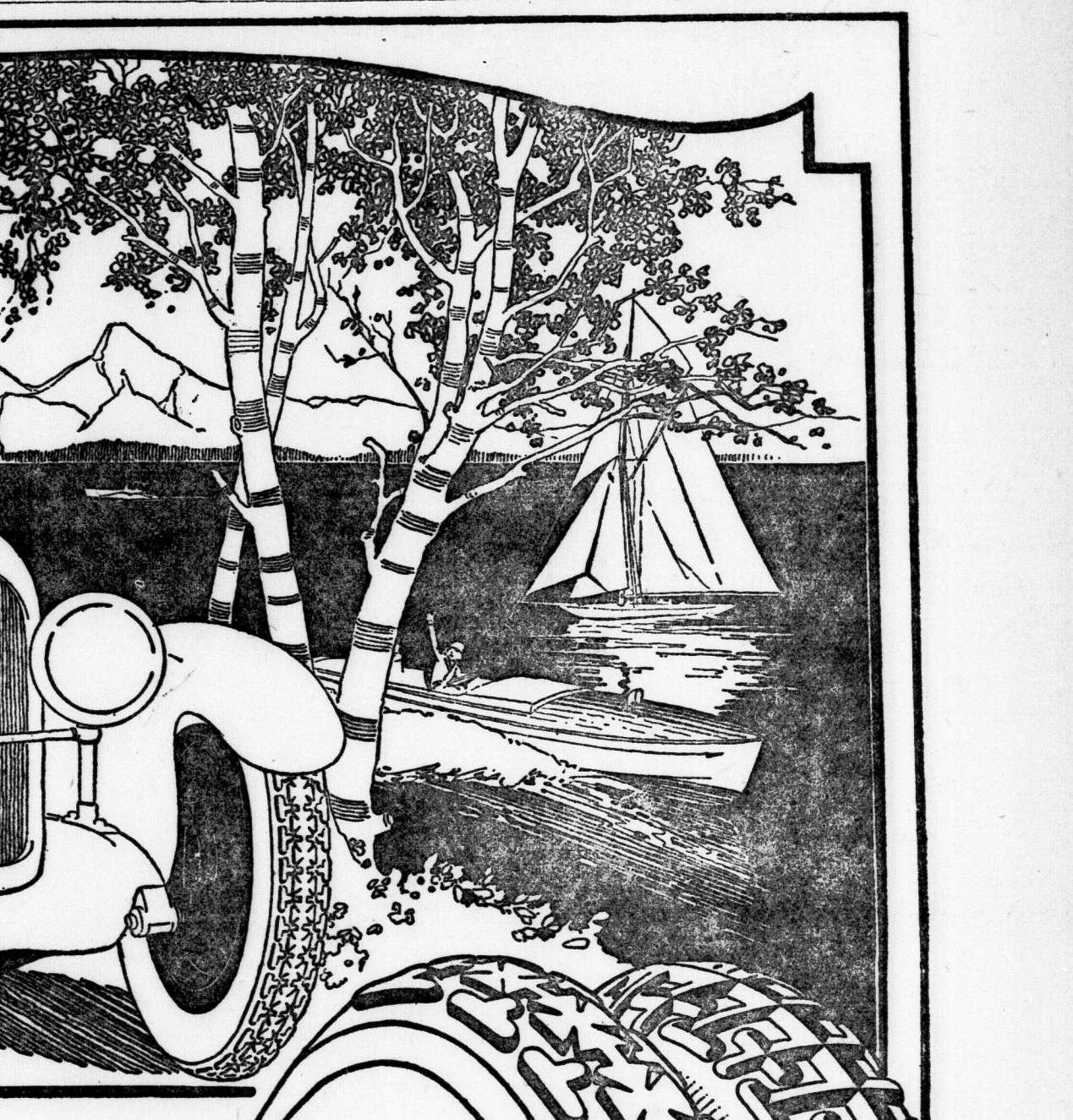
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
