DR. GANDIER INDUCTED NEW PRINCIPAL OF KNOX

Rev. Dr. MacLaren Deplores Shortage of Theological Students — Impressive Ceremony.

The induction of Rev. Dr. Gandier into the principalship of Knox College took place yesterday afternoon at St. James' Square Presbyterian Church. Rev. James Murray, moderator of Toronto Presbytery, presided. Rev. Dr. Gray preached from the text, Proverbs xxxi, 18: "Where there is no vision the people perish." The religious leaders from the earliest time to the present had been men of vision, and this was true in a marked degree of the late Principal Curran. Rev. Dr. Somerville offered the induction prayer. Rev. Dr. Gandier in answer to the formal questions of the moderator announced his belief in the divinity of the scriptures, acceptance of the Westminster confession of faith and the teachings of the Shuter Catechism. The moderator upon this clasped Dr. Gandier's hand and announced his induction into the principalship. Rev. Dr. Carmichael, of Kings, a member of Queen's University faculty at the time of Dr. Gandier's student days there, gave the charge to the new principal. It would be the duty of the new principal of Knox College, he said, to sharpen the church. They told how the line of credit asked for by the Weston firm had been obtained by the last one from the general manager to McNeil, the manager at the West Toronto branch, stating that it was a matter of principle to obtain Mrs. May's signature. The case will be continued to-day.

John Jennings, counsel for the Bank of Hamilton, and Mr. Justice Clute in the non-jury assize court yesterday afternoon had a stiff argument over the lawyer's persistent refusal to comply with the request of the bench, that certain correspondence relating to the case be produced in court. The action was brought by the bank against Eleanor, wife of E. J. May, of Weston, Ont., to recover \$57,324 on a guarantee. Wm. May and son of Weston applied to the Bank of Hamilton for a line of credit for \$2000, \$1000 on the firm's endorsement, and \$3000 on trade bills. This was granted after Mrs. May, who owns considerable property, attached her signature to a guaranteed. Considerable correspondence passed between the bank and the May's before the request was granted, however, and it was in a correspondence the justice wanted produced. W. E. Roney, K.C., counsel for Mrs. May, was examining William Halliday, chief of the branch of the bank at West Toronto, when the deadlock occurred. Mr. Jennings contended that he could not see what connection the correspondence had with the case, but the judge remained obdurate and absolutely refused to go on with the case until the papers were produced. "About half the time of this court is taken up by the refusal of counsel to lay the full facts of cases before the court, not only in this, but in other cases," said the judge.
