Imprisoned Under an Assumed Name to Prove Her Fermer Release Due to "Snobbishness."

LIVERPOOL. Jan. 23 .- That Lady LIVERPOOL, Jan. 23.—That Lady Censtance Lytton, sister of Lord Lyt-ton, is serving a sentence in Walton jall here, under the name of Jane Warton, for smashing the jail win-dows, has just leaked out and has caused a sensation among the sup-porters of the woman suffragists. Lady Lytton adopted a disguise of a work woman and set about to force the authorities to imprison her for the authorities to imprison her for the purpose of proving her assertion that Home Secretary Gladstone's re-cent action in releasing her from New-castle Jail on the official ground that she had a weak heart was really on account of her social position, and the agitation which was excited by the forcible feeding of the prisoners who refused to take food.

It is said that she is starving her-self again and is submitting to forcible feeding to prove that Mr. Gladstone's statement with reference to her "weak heart" was what she called it, "simply Liberal snobbishness. Lady Lytton came to Liverpool Jan.

14. She proceeded deliberately to smash the jail windows with stones. When arrested she gave the name of Jane Warton, and said she broke the windows as a protest against certain of the jail regulations. Lady Constance was sentenced to a fortnight's imprisnent, one week of which she has served




