NORTH TORONTO. NORTH TORONTO, April 1.—(Special.)—The water, fire and light committee met to-night.

The town engineer was instructed to have the registers in use between Zallion-street and Davville-avenue west of Alberta-crescent, opened up.

The Melrose Park Co. submitted a plan subdividing the McCollum farm at Bedford Park. The plan was referred to the engineer for his report.

The Dovercourt Land Co. notified the committee that they were prepared to bear the whole cost of laying a water main on Lawrence-avenue, 770 ft. in length. Referred to the clerk and the solicitor.

The Mine Coal Co. made application for permission to erect a shed on the corner of Yonge and Merton-streets, to be covered with metal sheeting and shingles. The committee could not see their way clear to grant this application, contrary to the town's by-laws.

James Shackleton made application for an increase of salary and the committee will recommend an increase of \$1 per week.

Engineer James recommended Mr. H. Boyer as foreman, with particular charge of the electric light, fire alarm system and water services at a weekly salary of \$13.50. Referred to the council.

LEASIDE. Anglican Mission is Rapidly Developing into Strong Church.

LEASIDE, April 1.—(Special.)—The annual vestry meeting of St. Cuthbert's Church, of England Mission, Leaside, was held Thursday evening. The rector, Rev. T. W. Peterson, presided, and there were present besides Rev. P. M. Lamb, the curate in charge of the mission, quite a large number of members of the congregation. The report of the wardens showed an increase of 180. Besides this well over \$400 had been expended on enlargement of the church building, the whole cost being met by special subscription, of which \$200 was granted out of the church fund and \$200 by the Ladies' Aid. The Ladies' Aid also raised \$50 for furnishings for the church. The mission has been re-organized, and a handsome new altar and lectern added these being the gift from the former furnishings of St. George's Church, Toronto. The report of the Sunday school showed an increase of nearly 100 per cent, with an average attendance of over 40 out of 70 on the roll, and a Bible class organized under the direction of Mr. Lamb. Messrs. J. M. Wilson and A. C. Rolph were re-appointed the rector and people's wardens respectively, and Messrs. Walter Hunt, Chas. Page, Chas. Gathers, Herb Pike, Herb Lee, Jas. Dundas and Chas. Hincho, sidesmen. Miss Estella Lee is organist of the church, Herbert Pike, superintendent, and Miss Gladys Hunt, treasurer of the Sunday school. There was a discussion with regard to the retention of Mr. Lamb for the ensuing year. As Mr. Lamb will shortly be fully ordained, it was realized that Leaside might not be able itself to raise sufficient for his maintenance, and Mr. Peterson assured the news that Christ Church, at Deer Park, was making arrangements by which any deficiency would be supplied. The plan as prepared was also to employ a young man as assistant curate, thus endeavoring to meet the wants of all parts of what is a very extensive parish.

AGINCOURT. Village is Getting to be Big Shipping Point.

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YORK COUNTY MAGISTRACY.

Council Made Choice, But Government Not Yet Decided.

A good deal of criticism has been aroused in some parts of York County over the action of the county council at their last session in favoring the appointment of John A. Ramsden to the office of police magistracy.

The appointment is conditional upon the action of the legislature, and this in turn upon the recommendation of the three provincial representatives, Alex. McCowan, M.L.A., Dr. Godfrey, M.L.A., and T. H. Lennox, M.L.A.

As high constable and county clerk Mr. Ramsden has been an excellent officer, and that he would acquire himself well in the latter sphere, a police magistrate, it is conceded, but the chief has always been an avowed Liberal.

There is strong opposition in North York to the selection of a Liberal.

Again, it is claimed that the cost to be charged against the municipality where a trial is held, will be high, and that local J. A.'s ought to assume the work.

Discussing the matter, The Express-Herald of Newmarket says it could name Conservative or Liberal either, who could fill the position with equal acceptance, and favors a party nomination.

Altogether the situation is an acute one, and is being awaited with interest.

WIDENING ST. CLAIR AVE. FOOD FOR MORE DEBATE

Works Committee Wants the Improvement, But Thinks Local Ratepayers Should Co-operate.


The widening of St. Clair-avenue is not yet a dead issue, as yesterday's proceeding of the civic works committee proved.

The committee, after a long discussion on a somewhat threadbare subject, decided that the avenue should be widened. After enunciating this as an academic principle, the members declined to take any further action, turning down a proposal to have the assessment commissioner report again on the apportionment of cost, and also giving a two weeks' hold to the plan of having the thoroughfare widened.

WARD 8 CONSERVATIVE BANQUET

Pledge Faith in R. L. Borden and Denounce His Critics.

Staunch defence of R. L. Borden and denunciation of his critics as a leader of the Conservative party in Canada was the chief strain in the annual banquet of Ward 8 Conservative Association in the Hotel Gladstone last night.

President R. B. Orr declared that in spite of the criticism being now leveled at him, Mr. Borden stood to-day pre-eminently above his critics and the first statesman in Canada.

"We listened, year after year, to the chant that J. P. Whitney would never land the Conservative party into power in the province. To-day he is not only a great premier, but is, in himself, the government of the whole province, and in a few years you will find that Mr. Borden will show up as a great and occupy even a more favored position among the statesmen of Canada than Mr. Whitney now occupies," said Dr. Orr.

E. B. Downey, M.P., and A. Claude Macdonell, M.P., spoke to the "Dominion Government" and, in a word, loyalty to the "distinguished leader of the Conservative party—R. L. Borden."

Other speakers were: W. D. McPherson, M.L.A., Dr. Thornton, A. W. Wright, Mayor Geary, Ald. D. Spence, Ald. McCausland, E. W. J. Owens and J. S. Carstairs.

An enthusiastic meeting was held at the Economist Office to-night when steps were taken to reorganise the lawn bowling club.

from Yonge-street to Avenue-road to a width of 88 feet, and the western section to 100 feet, and this was adopted. This was as far as the committee would pledge itself, however. Ald. Baird's subsequent motion that the assessment commissioner report on the apportionment of the cost being voted down. It was decided to defer the question of paying for two weeks, so as to give the members a chance to look over the ground.

The committee approved Ald. Weston's proposal providing that no opening, widening or extension of a street or lane as a local improvement be carried out unless petitioned for by a majority of the property owners affected, but reserving the right to the city engineer to recommend any work if he deemed it in the interest of the general public.

Desirable, But— In the general discussion which followed, the unanimous opinion was expressed that the widening was desirable, but there was by no means the same feeling that the city at large should shoulder the great bulk of the cost. Chairman Ald. Chisholm stated that as a result of a revaluation by the assessment commissioner, the expense of the undertaking was now figured at a materially higher figure than the original estimate of \$170,000.

The city engineer said that the avenue was badly in need of paving and that something should be done to settle its future.

Ald. Baird moved that the committee place itself on record as favorable to widening that portion of the avenue

WIDENING ST. CLAIR AVE. PUBLIC BODIES INTERESTED.

Deputations representing the guild of civic art and board of trade asked that the question of widening be reopened. John Ewen, president of the guild, declared that the avenue was bound to become a great thoroughfare from East to West Toronto, and that to imagine it would not be ultimately used for street cars was absurd. It should be widened to a width of from 88 to 100 feet.

Lionel Clarke, a past president of the board of trade, said St. Clair-avenue would certainly develop into a great business street. It should be widened, and a compromise might be made at \$5 feet. He thought the city at large might fairly be asked to pay two-thirds of the cost.

A. J. Russell Snow, speaking as a resident of a street south of St. Clair-avenue, objected to being taxed for the work. If the avenue were to be made into a driveway and boulevard, the value of land along St. Clair-avenue would be enhanced, and the residents should pay for the improvement; if it were to be used for street cars, property would be depreciated, and it would be gross injustice to assess the residents.

Dr. Bruce, speaking as the owner of property on St. Clair-avenue, said he thought a local improvement tax of 25 per cent. of the cost would be fair. J. B. O'Brien of the guild of civic art suggested that the assessment commissioner be instructed to report again on the widening.

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
