The Yankees never have had so many pitchers, and if numbers count for anything, the local American League club should cut quite a figure in the pennant chase this season.

It is a mystery where Kelley discovered them all. No one knew that there were so many recruit pitchers good enough to be considered candidates for the major leagues.

The new pitchers include such strangers as Tommie Bloodett, Neal Brady, Slim Love, Cliff Markle, Ford Meadows, Geo. Nigrid, Willie Plency, Sam Rose, Uban Shockley, Dan Tiple, Dazy Vance, Allan Russell, Gilman Day, George Finn, and also the well-known citizens, Ray Kestling and the new Federal League prize, Nick Cullip.

Slam Love is the most interesting of these new pitchers, because he stands about 6 feet 6 inches in height. Ray Kestling's work will be watched with interest. A year ago he had to give up pitching because of an injury to his hip. It is said that he has entirely recovered, and will be able to pitch as well as ever this season.
