"The use of my name in connection with this seizure is just an attempt by the department of justice to discredit me and the "virt government thru arousing sympathy for the Russian imperial family."

Martens expressed the opinion that the jewels seized here were probably the property of some individual refugee. He declared it was companon practice for refugees of Russia, Poland and other war-stricken countries to send their jewels here to be turned into cash.
