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Three Wounded In The 26th

The official casualty list, of 9 o'clock last night, verifies the unofficial report received here on Saturday that Major John Allen Macdonald has been wounded. The list also contains the name of Walter Manning, Newton (N. B.), 26th battalion, wounded. The first appearance of the 26th Battalion among the casualties announces that Ovid Lutz, Westmorland county, is seriously ill. Sgt. James A. MacDonald, Glace Bay (N. S.), is reported killed in action with the 1st battalion. John Conn, Sydney Mines (N. S.), is reported to have died of wounds. He was rescued when the hospital ship Anglia went to the bottom, but has succumbed at Stornoway.

Conspicuous names in the list are: Lieut. G. G. Greenfield, Montreal, wounded with 26th; and Captain John L. Higginson, Loughhead (Alta.), killed in action with the 15th battalion.

The midnight list has the name of Arthur Thompson, Truro (N. S.), wounded with the 26th Battalion.

In the 26th, G. E. Pinney, of East St. John, is reported wounded. Gordon Pinney is 22 years of age, a very popular young man about East St. John and the city, and his friends will hope that his wounds will not prove serious.

The German effort, which met with initial success, was doomed to final failure, as the country is a great marsh, and in the opinion of Petrograd, the offensive was taken for political, not military, purposes with the object of impressing the Roumanians.

In Couland the weather has enforced illness upon both armies.

Searching Greek Vessels.

London, Nov. 22—An Athens despatch to the Times says it is confirmed that the Entente Powers have imposed restrictions on Greek trade. The Allied fleets, it is added, have already begun searching all the steamers flying the Greek flag in the Aegean and Mediterranean.

Dead Found in Boat.

Taranto, Italy, Nov. 20—One of the missing boats of the Italian liner Ancon, recently sunk by a submarine, has been found beached near this port. It contained thirteen bodies.

THE WEEK-END WAR SUMMARY

Greece Given Notice to Join Allies or Demobilize

GOVERNMENT MORE FRIENDLY

Situation of Serbian Army Still Desperate—Little Change on Other Fronts—German Effort in East Fails

London, Nov. 21—The Entente Allies have demanded that Greece either join with them and fulfill her treaty obligations to Serbia, or demobilize, and to impress King Constantine that they mean what they say, the Allies have declared a commercial blockade of the Hellenic empire, according to despatches from Athens.

There is no confirmation of these statements, available here, but it is very certain that Lord Kitchener, the British war secretary, who had a hearty audience with the King of Greece yesterday, and afterwards saw Premier Skouloufides, took a firm stand and told them that the Allies could and would do unless the demands were conceded.

The Greek cabinet met to consider the situation, and a few hours should show what Greece's future attitude will be. The Greek government again has affirmed its friendliness to the Allies but has not yet taken the steps required to prevent Greece from being counted among the friends of the Central Powers.

SERBIANS MAKE LAST STAND.

The Entente Allies will not permit any delay; the position of the Serbian armies makes any prolongation of the present uncertainty impossible. Already the Serbians are making what may be their last stand before Monastir, and also in the plains of Kosovo.

The Bulgarians, it is true, are being held up by unfavorable weather conditions, but they must be almost at the gates of the Macedonian capital by this time, while the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians are slowly but surely pressing back the northern army.

The Germans announce today the capture of Novi-Pazar, and are therefore on the march to Belgrade, which has been the Serbian capital since Nish fell into the hands of the Bulgarians.

Other armies pressing in from the north, the northwest and the northeast, and the east, and even the Montenegrins, who held their positions for so long, are being forced back.

Of the French and British troops in the south no news was received. Apparently they are only holding their positions, and can no longer hope to repulse resistance in the Serbian, except by keeping a large number of Bulgarians engaged. According to German reports, an effort will be made by the French and British to save the Serbian armies by sending troops through Montenegro and Albania, but, with no roads, it will take a long time for them to reach the battlefield.

RUSSIANS IN CZARTORYSK.

There is no change on the other battlefronts. The Russians are still fighting for Gorizia, and the Russians are regaining ground which they lost along the Stry river last week. Czartorysk, the village unknown before the war, and which became famous for the bitter fighting that has occurred around it, is again in the possession of the Russians, who evidently let the Germans enter simply to shell them out the next day.

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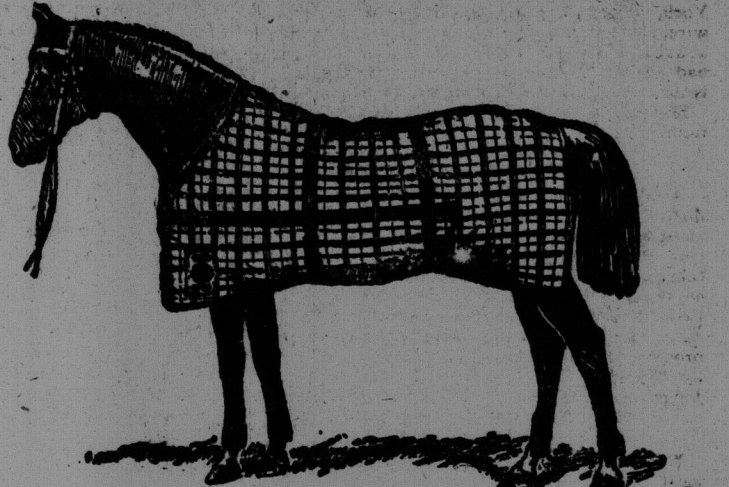
