TO SEE THE SORTING GAPS IN OPERATION

Session of International St. John River Commission at Van Buren Next Week

In order to secure further information relative to the sorting gaps and the handling of logs by the St. John river at Van Buren, where several large lumber manufacturing mills are located, the International St. John River Commission has decided to hold a hearing at Van Buren on May 25.

At this meeting W. J. Lannigan of Waterbury, who is in charge of the timber land department of the large pulp and paper manufacturing concern of Hollingsworth & Whitney Co., and George Dunn of Houlton, a well known lumberman and large timberland owner in northern Maine, are to give expert testimony concerning sorting gaps and methods of handling logs.

The original trouble on the St. John river in 1905, known as the "Van Buren War," arose from the fact that the men handling the logs destined for further down the St. John river believed that the logs were being held too long at the sorting gaps and delayed so that the drop of water in the river might prevent them from reaching their destination below.

The point that the commission is to determine in regard to the handling of logs, is an important one.

RULES FOR DEALING WITH FLY NUISANCE

(Issued by the Department of the Public Health, Nova Scotia.)

As the fly season is just about due, attention is again called to the great importance of ridding our communities of this filthy, death-dealing pest.

It is now so well known that flies are largely responsible for the dissemination of such diseases as tuberculosis, typhoid fever and infantile diarrhoea, that indifference to their presence in the home and neighborhood would seem to merit the verdict of criminal negligence.

While the trapping and swatting of flies is a useful and same procedure, it must not be forgotten that the most rational way of attaining freedom from them is to prevent them from breeding.

This is to be accomplished by destroying or properly screening their breeding places. It is particularly in manure garbage and decomposing refuse that flies breed, so particular attention should be given to the frequent and thorough emptying of all receptacles against the entrance of flies.

Keep all stable manure in vault or pit, screened, or sprinkled with lime, oil or other cheap preparations such as are sold by a number of reliable manufacturers.

Do not allow decaying material of any sort to accumulate in or near your premises.

Burn or bury all table and kitchen refuse.

Keep all receptacles for garbage carefully covered, and have the cans frequently cleaned or sprinkled with oil or lime.

All refuse which tends in any way to fermentation, such as bedding straw, papers, waste and vegetable matter, should be disposed of or covered with lime or kerosene oil.

If you see flies, you be sure that their breeding place is in nearby filth. It may be behind the door, under the table or in the cuspidor.

If there is no dirt and filth there will be no flies.

If there is a nuisance in the neighborhood write at once to the Board of Health of the community in which you reside.

See that your sewerage system is in good order; that it does not leak, is up-to-date, and not exposed to flies.

Four kerosene into the drains.

Screen all windows and doors, especially in the kitchen and dining room.

Keep the flies away from the sick, especially those ill with contagious disease.

Kill every fly that strays into the sick room. His body is covered with disease germs.

Do not patronize grocery shops and markets that harbor and feed flies. Insist upon screens.
