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BOSTON BUILDING FALLS, EIGHT KILLED

MANY INJURED
AND BURIED
UNDER DEBRIS

Unidentified Woman Killed When Club House Collapses
NO WARNING
Weakened Wall Crashes Suddenly—Rescue Work Carried on Under Difficulties

BOSTON, July 4.—Police estimated at 9:30 o'clock this morning that at least eight persons had lost their lives in the collapse of a wall of the Pickwick Club, early today.

BOSTON, July 4.—One woman dead, two seriously injured, four others less seriously hurt and five slightly injured—this was the toll at 6 o'clock this morning following the sudden collapse of a five-story brick building housing the Pickwick Club, the scene of an early fourth of July revel.

THE INJURED
Mary McDougall, 20, of Boston, fractured skull.
Miss Greta Carlson, 20, Belmont, scalp partly torn off.
Mrs. Madam, Roxbury, fractured cheek bone and contusions.
Jake Rosenberg, officer on United States coast guard cutter, Mohave, compound fracture of left leg.
Katherine Walker, 25, Roxbury, multiple contusions.
Edward Whalen, Boston, lacerated leg.
One wall of the five story structure, weakened by an excavation on the adjoining property, went down, leaving three standing. The roof and the three upper stories crashed down upon the second floor where more than a hundred men and girls were dancing and carried that floor and the ground floor into the basement.

BANK TELLER IS FOUND NOT GUILTY
Stealing Charge Not Sustained in Sydney Case—Another Accused.

SYDNEY, N. S., July 4.—After three and one-half hours' deliberation by the petit jury, Justin Bennett, former teller in the Glace Bay branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, was tonight found "not guilty" of the charge of stealing \$19,944.47 of the bank's money. Bennett was removed to the county jail following the acquittal, where he will remain pending the hearing of another charge against him, that of stealing \$800 from the bank.

Norway's Capital In Gala Attire For Civic Welcome To Amundsen and Companions

OSLO, July 4.—Norway's capital is in gala dress for the reception on Sunday to Captain Amundsen and his colleagues, returning from their polar flight. The admiralty expects that the explorers will land at the port of Oslo at one o'clock in the afternoon. Unless unforeseen circumstances develop, they will fly from Horten to Oslo on the N-25, on which they returned to Spitzbergen after having been wedged in the ice for many days.

German Government Protests Against Death Sentences In Russia

Berlin Moves For Stay of Executions

Sentence of Three Plotters Titled "Judicial Farce"
BREAK POSSIBLE
Rupture of Relations Is Openly Demanded by Newspapers; Political Blackmail Is Charge

BERLIN, July 4.—A vigorous protest has been dispatched by the Foreign Office to the Soviet Government at Moscow against the verdict of the Soviet Supreme Court in the case of Dr. Karl Kindermann, Max von Ditmar and Theodore Volodskoy, who were sentenced to death for plotting to kill Leon Trotsky and a number of Communist officials. The Foreign Office demands that carrying out sentences be deferred.

It was made clear at the Foreign Office that while the "judicial farce" in Moscow is looked upon as an occasion for tending seriously to impart the friendly relations of the two countries as rupture of diplomatic relations is contemplated.

A rupture of relations, however, openly demanded by the newspapers, is frankly designated as "political blackmail."
