## "Bob" Atcheson To Handle Final Game For The Nova Scotia Title

### ALLISON PARK ONE OF BEST IN PROVINCES

#### Trojans Plan to Include U.N.B., Mt. A. and Moncton

JUDGING from last night's turnout of senior football players on the Allison grounds, the Trojans will have a great team this season and the veteran players will have to step lively in order to retain their regular positions on the line-up. Pete Millidge, playing his fourth season with the Trojans, has been appointed captain for 1925, with Cecil F. West as coach. The Allison grounds are in excellent condition for the Rugby season, and the Trojans have already set their playing dates to commence with a game in Saint John on October 3.

#### SPLENDID GROUNDS

When the Trojans' Rugby team was first organized in 1922 the Allison grounds were in terrible shape and it was not until some time ago that the grounds were moved to the Allison grounds, and even then it was really unfit for football, with the result that accidents to players were quite numerous. Determined to carry on with the game, the Trojans continued to use the Allison grounds the following year. Last summer the ground was sodden, and the Trojans were forced to use the East End ball park for their home games, resulting in a series of accidents that practically crippled the team at one time or less than nine players were out of the game. After three years of uphill fighting to keep the senior game alive, the Trojans have, at last, a field that ranks second to none in the Maritimes. Those in charge of the Allison grounds have been quick to realize what the Trojans have experienced in previous years, and yesterday granted permission to their manager to use the grounds to the same extent as the team did in past years. Regular practices will be held, commencing this afternoon at 3 o'clock and continuing every Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings at 6 o'clock.

#### MAY FORM LEAGUE

The Trojans are anxious that every available player in Saint John should turn out for practice, as they are contemplating the formation of a New Brunswick Rugby League comprising the following teams: Trojans, U. N. B., Mount A. and Moncton, making a strong four-team league. Should such a league be formed it would give the Trojans three games at home and three away, with one date left open for Acadia University to play here. Arrangements have already been completed for a game with Acadia. This game should create unusual interest locally, as it will mark the first appearance of an Acadia Rugby team in this city. Trojans all in the coming senior Rugby season should be most successful. The Trojans have the grounds, they have the team, and their programme looks good—all that is needed now is some good strenuous practice and sufficient support from the public.

#### THE POWER OF EXAMPLE

Up at Grand Falls many years ago, there arrived one day a little old "professor." His calling was not one of those high vocations, such as the ministry, the law, or medicine. In fact, it's a pretty safe bet that no university in the world listed him on the faculty. Nevertheless, he was known as the "professor." One day, he secured the help of some men and rigged up a tightly-stretched wire over the famed and fearsome Grand Falls. Then, he walked over it, alone. In the audience that day that watched with bated breath as the "professor" traveled gingerly over those dizzy heights, where one false slip meant an awful death, was a lad of seven years old. Following the hair-raising performance, the youngster went to his backyard, rigged up a rope and commenced practicing. For many years, he kept faithfully at it. His name is Herman Sirols. He is 15 years. He is appearing here at the Exhibition and doing splendidly. In fact, if the Exhibition authorities had announced they had secured the far-famed Professor Sirols of Kalamazoo in a "death-defying, daredevil act" the people would not have been better satisfied. Now, this boy did not say he would be a tight wire expert and then sit down and read all about the art. He used the materials at hand and has won out. No where more than in the field of sport is this kind of spirit needed to cause an athlete to rise above the average. Only by dogged, persistent effort can an athlete hope to reach the heights for no matter how talented a boy may be, the field is not far behind him unless he exerts himself to the utmost. And when he gets there, it is a battle to remain. But that is what makes sport so appealing to every red-blooded young fellow. The power of example of what the other fellow has done and the desire implanted in him to excel!

### PAUL BERLENBACH K. O'S SLATTERY

#### Light Heavyweight Has Little Difficulty With Buffalo Boy.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The world's light heavyweight champion, which has perched atop five heads in the last five years, withstood the challenge of youthful Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo, N. Y., under the sturdy defence of Paul Berlenbach, rugged title holder, of Astoria, N. Y., before a throng of 35,000 at the New York American League Baseball Park last night. The stout-hearted Irish boy from Buffalo went down in the eleventh round of a 15-round battle, under the terrific punches of the champion, after gamely fighting his way around the ring, relentless attack which floored him six times before Referee Patsy Haley stopped the fight. Slattery was awarded Berlenbach a technical knockout.

#### K—Add Berlenbach—fb

Round 1.—Slattery started to dance around the champion with lightning speed. They exchanged light blows. Slattery pulled an upper cut to the champion's jaw. They clinched. Both landed to the head. The champion staggered Slattery with right to body. Another uppercut rocked Berlenbach. A straight right and left to the jaw backed the champion to the ropes. Slattery was boxing prettily. They were dancing at the bell. Round 2.—Slattery led with a right to the head but took Berlenbach's heavy right in return. Berlenbach chased his challenger half way around the ring. Berlenbach scored to the body at close quarters. The champion rushed Slattery to the corner and had him groggy with a four charge. A heavy right sent Slattery back on his heels. They were in a clinch at the bell. Round 3.—Slattery crashed to Berlenbach's body. Slattery's left jab was bothering the champion. Berlenbach allowed Slattery with right to body. Slattery pulled an upper cut to the champion's jaw. There was much wrestling. The champion was landing frequently to Slattery's head and body. A smashing left square to the face sent Slattery groggy and he reeled about the ring in an uncertain fashion hanging on to the champion whenever possible. The champion was weakening his opponent with his heavy blows. The bell found the challenger in a groggy condition. From then on until the closing round Slattery never had a chance. Round 4.—A weak left sent Slattery to the ropes. Slattery's style was bothering Berlenbach. Berlenbach chased his challenger half way around the ring. Every other charge ended in a clinch. Three times Berlenbach landed to the head and Slattery's knees sagged. A left staggered Slattery to the ropes. And other left turned him around. They wrestled and Slattery went down from the force of the charge. He was up at eight. Another push from Berlenbach sent him down for nine. The champion bored in landing almost at will at the defenseless challenger. He went down but the bell saved him at the count of four.

#### ROUND ELEVEN.

Round 11.—A stiff right to the jaw floored Slattery again for a count of 8. The challenger was absorbing terrific punishment. Another lunge sent Slattery down for a count of nine. They wrestled and Slattery poured a furious charge at the utterly defenseless challenger. The referee started to step in to stop the fight but stopped when Slattery appeared to be weathering the storm. Three times Berlenbach smashed Slattery to the ropes. Slattery's unprotected face and the Buffalo boy started to sink to the canvas. Referee Patsy Haley then stopped the fight and waved Berlenbach to his corner.

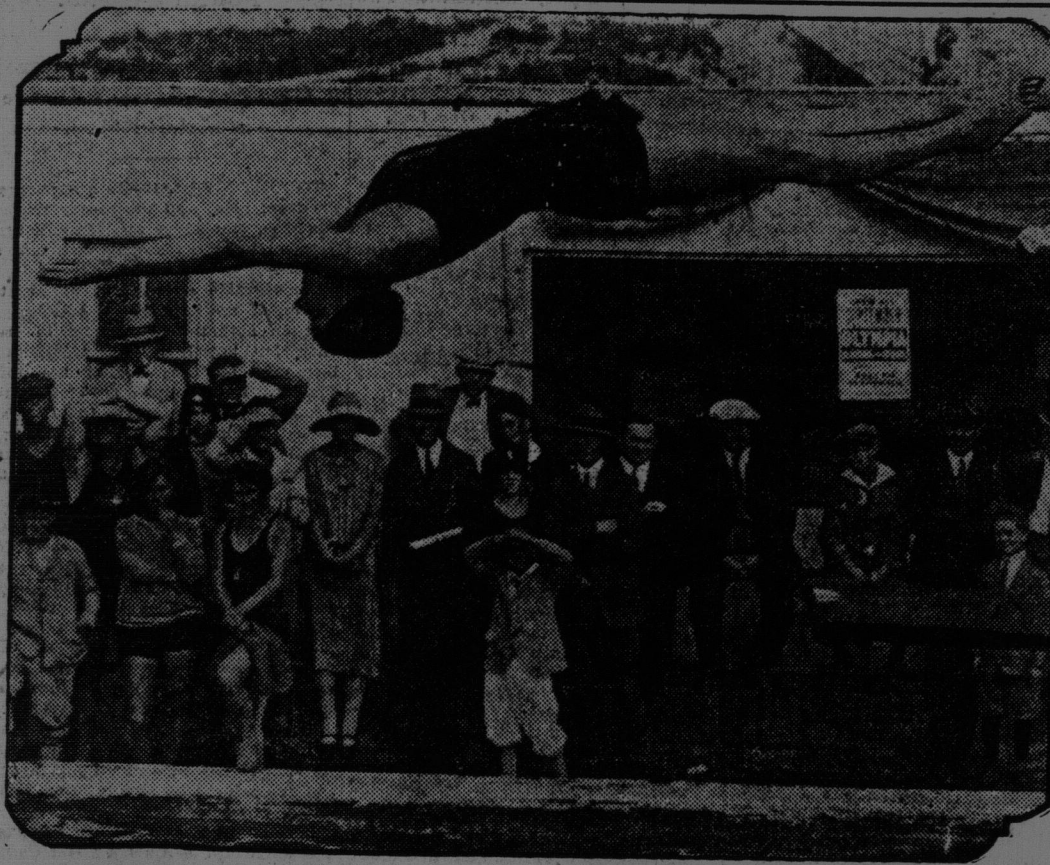
