PROMINENT GRADUATES GIVE ASSISTANCE FOR U. N. B.'S TRIP

FREDERICTON ENTHUSIASTIC OVER MONTREAL TRIP

Montreal Rugby Outfit Expected to Put Up Hard Fight

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 13.—Not in a decade has this seat of learning been so enthusiastic as it is today over the departure this afternoon of the University of New Brunswick's rugby team for Montreal, where they will play the Montreal Rugby Club for the MacTier Cup, emblematic of the championship of Eastern Canada, Saturday afternoon on the McGill Campus. One success after another by Captain Paul Fraser's hand of warriors has only served to whet the appetite of the fans for more victories, and the fact that U. N. B. has won the intercollegiate crown for the Martinis has paved the way for the background somewhat as the team gets ready for its long trip to the metropolis.

Some idea of the enthusiasm that has developed amongst the students is in evidence at a general students' meeting yesterday noon when letters from two prominent alumni were read giving aid to the heavy task of taking the rugby football team of the university to Montreal to play for the MacTier Cup. The letters were from Charles E. Neill, general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, and Sir Frederick Williams Taylor of the Bank of Montreal. Both of these gentlemen are honorary doctors of law of the university and at an earlier date a few years ago delivered addresses to the graduating classes. Neill is a distinguished son of New Brunswick who has been exceedingly successful in the banking profession.

Generous Provision.

The telegram from Mr. Neill stated that he was prepared to meet the expected deficit of \$400 on the expenses of the trip, also that he had made arrangements for the accommodation of the team at the Mount Royal Hotel and for its transportation from station to hotel and for hotel to playing field. Mr. Neill also arranged with the captain of the Montreal English Rugby team which is to defend the MacTier Cup, to meet the U. N. B. team at Windsor station. Sir Frederick Williams Taylor's communication included a subscription of \$100 toward expenses and this donation was heartily applauded.

The team is expected to go in good physical shape, with Chip Seely being the only regular on the sidelines.

THE biggest junior league in basketball circles in many years opens proceedings in the Y. M. C. I. tonight when the M. R. A. team meets the Nationals A. C., both newly-formed teams. This is an item of more than ordinary interest in local sport circles not because of the fact that it is the biggest league in years but principally because of the fact that we have a junior league at all. It's a fine big cauldron now with a seething, indistinguishable mass boiling things up but when the net is spread and the drainage for senior players takes place not many years hence we can see where this city will still be able to rule the basketball roost in these parts, as it has done ever since McGill doctor invented the game. There are fourteen teams entered and according to the experts on each team, there will be fourteen winners if we are to believe all of them. The league will do the city and the boys good because it is organized. A few nights ago, we stood on Pitt street and watched a gang of juniors play rugby. The dividing line was the street car track and the goal line was the gutter while the scrim consisted of two hard-boiled guys. 23 goals constituted the game and we confess we stayed until the last touchdown had been made. EDMONTON NOW IS EXPECTED TO KEEP ESKIMOS

Forward Line of Canadiens Shapes Up Well in Practises

EDMONTON, Nov. 13.—It is now expected that Edmonton will keep its professional hockey team this winter. The decision of Manager MacKenzie to keep his Eskimos in Edmonton instead of moving the team to Regina, is contingent upon the sum of \$10,000 being raised through the advance sale of tickets by noon on Saturday, but as 70 per cent. of this amount has already been pledged, the objective is in sight.
