
Forward Line of Cana-

EDMONTON, Nov. 13—It is now expected that Edmonton will keep its professional hockey team this winter. The decision of Manager Mackenzie to keep his Eskimos in Edmonton instead of moving the team to Regina, is contingent upon the sum of \$10,000 being raised through the advance sale of tickets by noon on Saturday, but as 70 per cent. of this amount has already been pledged, the objective is in sight.

Leduc, the local amateur, who signed with Canadiens last spring, is the sub-defence man. Montreal Maroons' practice yesterday had all the earmarks of a regular game, and provided some 800 spectators with plenty of thrills as the two sides battled.



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
