Important Developments in E m pire Settlement Expected From Conference

London, Sept. 24—Developments of an important character with relation to Empire settlement are expected to result from the Imperial Conference, where the question of emigration to the Dominions will be an outstanding feature of the discussions. Full inquiry will be made into the results of the state-aided policy since the Imperial Conference of 1921 and questions relations to the training of intending settlers before leaving Great Britain and in the Dominions is being emphassized in many quarters and it is contended that men with the necessary physique and the inclination to engage in agriculture should be given an idea before they sail as to what will be required of them overseas.

A far-reaching proposal is being discussed by officials of the Government and representatives of Canada which has for its object the enlarging of the soldiers' settlement scheme so as to include civilians. This marks an important advance in the emigration policy. The plan is in process of preparation for submission to the Imperial Conference.

Obed Smith, Canadian superintendent of emigration here, seen by a Canadian Press correspondent, spoke of the value of preliminary training. He said: "In the last twenty-five years so many members of the rural population of Great Britain have gone into the towns that it is necessary to go to the large industrial areas for settlers. Reports received show that there are men there who are admirably suited for work on the land.


