

## LITTLE PATIENTS TO RECEIVE GIFTS

Junior Red Cross Branches  
Send Scrap Books and  
Other Handwork

A large suitcase packed tight as could be was not large enough to hold all of the lovely scrap books and other sample of the handwork of the Junior Red Cross members which were to be seen in the office of the Junior supervisors yesterday. These gifts came from the Junior branches throughout the province and will be distributed among each and every one of the hospital patients in New Brunswick for the children patients. The face cloths, of which there are many scores, all very neatly and carefully made, will go to the soldiers in the D. S. C. R. hospital.

Each piece of work sent in by the Junior members showed evidence of scrupulous care and the scrap books were exceptionally made and exceptionally pleasing with regard to the quality and arrangement of the pictures. "The Severn" branch at the Middlesex school at Coverdale, outside of Moncton, sent scrap books made in specially attractive shape. There was a Christmas bell book, for Christmas, a pumpkin shaped book for Halloween, a heart shaped book for Valentine's day and a book with special pictures for Easter.

Middlesex branch in its contributions had a specially substantial scrap book for Mary the Junior Red Cross patient in the General Public Hospital. The "Conquerors" of Moore's Mills sent scrap books with red covers in the correct Red Cross shape. The "Happy Helpers" of Jacksonville, and the "Young Canadians" of Hillsboro, sent books that had very nice pictures. Upper Waterville branch scrap books had many jokes and pretty pictures well placed. Among the Rolling Dam scrap books were heart shapes and oval shapes. From Upper Carleton Place came a very fine scrap book with many stories and funny tales among its contents. The Carleton Place scrap book stories were all in French. It had a cover which was a piece of color drawing that one Upper Carleton member had done. The scrap books from McKee's Mills also had many stories pasted in and their outside covers were most attractive. Old Ridge branch in Charlotte county sent some scrap books which were exceptionally fine pieces of work.

The Rolling Dam branch sent half a dozen home-made puzzles, which called upon the solver to move a piece of cardboard on a string. The puzzles seemed extremely difficult. The Hammond River branch sent a dressed baby doll, a child's sweater, a pair of mittens for a child and a doll's sweater that was about as ingenious a piece of work as could be imagined.

Luxor, Jan. 14—Howard Carter, perched on the elaborate scaffolding which has been erected about the canopy in the tomb of Tutankhamen drew the attention of the correspondents today to the many evidences of hasty or careless work on the part of the undertakers who 30 centuries ago by the light of smoky lamps assembled the four shrines about the great crystalline sarcophagus containing Tutankhamen's mummy.

On the golden enstatite of the second shrine are marks left by the copper chisels or levers of the ancient carpenters as they eased the lid into place and at the corners are bruises on plaster or wood.

## GIVES \$500 TOWARD FIREPROOF BUILDING

Natural History Society Dis-  
cusses Addition to House  
Valuable Collections

The first cash contribution towards the proposed fireproof building for the Natural History Society's museum collections was received yesterday when \$500 was presented by Dr. Murray MacLaren, C. M. G., M. P. Dr. MacLaren's very welcome gift was announced at the meeting of the building committee of the society and there were many expressions of grateful appreciation. In the will of the late W. Frank Hatheway there was a bequest of \$1,000 for the Natural History Society's new building, subject to the proviso that building be furnished within three years. The number and value of the museum collections make it a matter of grave concern that there is not more suitable housing than is found in the present too small and non-fireproof structure.

W. F. Burditt, chairman of the committee, presided at yesterday's meeting and others present were T. H. Ettabrooks, Geoffrey Stead and William Macintosh, curator of the museum. The possibility of erecting a commodious fireproof addition to the present building was the matter discussed. While this scheme would not be the ideal of the members of the committee or most desirable from the viewpoint of the worth of the collections, it was felt that a fireproof addition might perhaps be the best solution of the difficulty that could be found under the present conditions. Plans of the proposed addition were before the meeting.

## INVITED TO TRAIN TEACHERS IN CITY

There was a fair attendance at the Free Kindergarten Association meeting yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms. Mrs. Allan G. McAvity, president, was in the chair and Miss Marjorie Knight was secretary. Mrs. H. H. Pickett gave interesting reports of the work being carried on in the various centres since the exchange of assistant teachers. This innovation was made in order that the assistants, in the absence of a training school, might have the experience of being under the direction of different supervisors. ## ANOTHER DROP IN OVERSEAS MONEY

New York, Jan. 14—Millions of French francs were thrown into the London, Paris, Amsterdam and New York markets today by European speculators, causing the demand rate to break 98 points to 4.27 cents, the lowest price ever recorded. Subsequent short covering carried the rate to 4.40 again in the late afternoon. Sharp breaks also took place in sterling, guilder and yen exchanges. Demand sterling dropped nearly four cents to 4.22%. Dutch guilders broke 60 points to 36.80 and Japanese yen also slumped. All made partial recovery later.
