

TENDERS SOON FOR HYDRO-ELECTRIC \$1,800,000 BONDS

Fredericton, Jan. 5.—The Province of New Brunswick will call at once for tenders for bonds to the value of \$1,800,000 for hydro-electric development and highway construction. These bonds will bear interest at the rate of six per cent, payable in Canada, and five and a half per cent, payable in the United States. They will run for a period of five years.

Contrary to what had expected, Premier Foster said tonight that there would be no statement at this meeting with regard to the dates for by-elections in Kings, Madawaska and St. John county, except that there would be no by-election this month.

Hon. J. E. Hetherington, provincial secretary-treasurer, will leave shortly for Hot Springs (Ark.) to spend some time for the benefit of his health.

RIORDON COMPANY DEFAULTS ON BONDS

Montreal, Jan. 5.—The Riordon Company is in default of a payment of \$120,000 interests which became due Jan. 1 on \$4,000,000 ten-year six per cent general mortgage sinking fund bonds. This issue ranks second in the three bond issues of the enterprise.

Interest on the first issue which fell due Dec. 31 has been met, it is understood, by the bondholders of the second issue.

It is believed a way will be found to meet the interest on the second issue now overdue and foreclosure is considered unlikely.

EVER-BEARING ORANGE TREES.

An ever-bearing orange tree which citrus fruit growers believed is destined to revolutionize the orange industry of the State of Florida, it is not of the entire country, has been discovered by horticulturists in a small grove at Avon Park, near Tampa, and to protect the specimen its purchasers have placed around it a heavy wire fence twenty feet in height, and stationed guards day and night. The tree has been in bearing continuously eight years, but until recently its existence was known only to the owner and several neighbors, who, according to citrus experts, did not realize its value, but regarded it merely as a freak of nature. A syndicate has been formed to propagate the tree through budding, so that a large number of trees may be set out in groves in 1923.

A Sealatin Church.

The world's queerest church was discovered not long ago by a missionary in the Arctic. It stands on Blacklead Island, Cumberland Sound, and it is constructed entirely of sealbladders. Wood and other building material not being available, the missionary responsible for its erection sewed the skins together and stretched them over whalebone "scaffolds."

Another Eskimo missionary built a church of snow, with seats, altar and pulpit complete. He said that his snow-built edifice was warmer than most churches he had visited in England.

BIG ORDER FOR EXPORT.

The manner in which Canadian manufacturers are again reaching out toward foreign markets is shown very clearly in the records of export shipments produced from time to time. An interesting item of the unusual type appearing recently was that of a shipment of \$12,000 worth of windmills by an Ontario firm to the Island of Cyprus.
