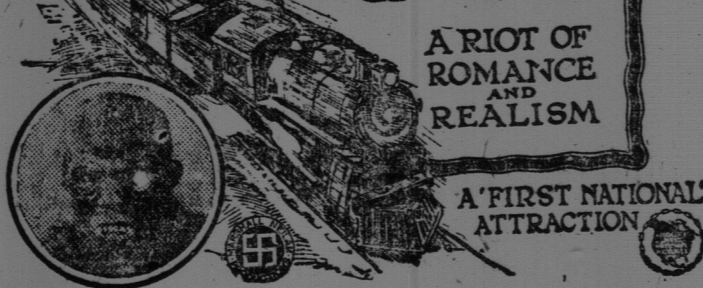

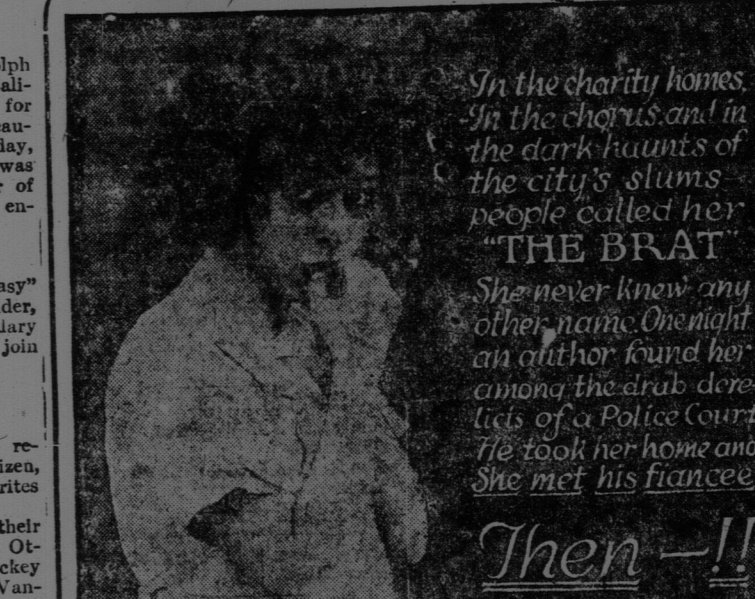
Eleven Recruits Let Go.

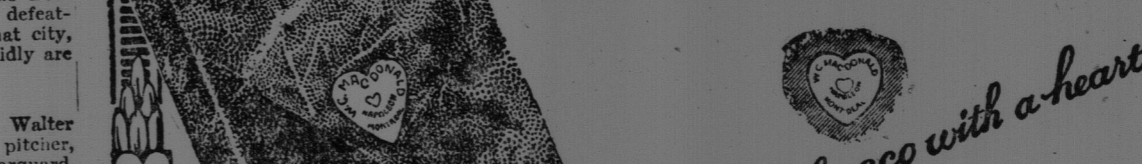
