## SAXON ROBBER KING CAUGHT BY POLICE

Famous Max Hoelz, Brigand  
of Vogtland, Awaits Trial  
in Berlin.

Berlin, April 20—Max Hoelz, known variously as Saxon robber king and red brigand, of Vogtland, has at last fallen into the clutches of the police and now awaits trial in Berlin. Hoelz made himself famous last year, when, following the Kapp putsch, he organized a red army of a few hundred and terrorized a wide countryside in Saxony. Proclaiming himself Lord of Vogtland, he seized castles, plundered mansions and banks, and generally behaved like a robber baron of the middle ages. Once he was caught but escaped and disappeared from the public eye. Investigations of the recent communist rebellion, however, produced evidence that Hoelz was the guiding spirit and plotted among other outrages, the foiled attempt to blow up the Victory monument in Berlin.

When arrested in the west end of Berlin last night, he bore no resemblance to the original brigand, having shaved his flowing beard and was trucked through being noticed in company of notorious Communists.

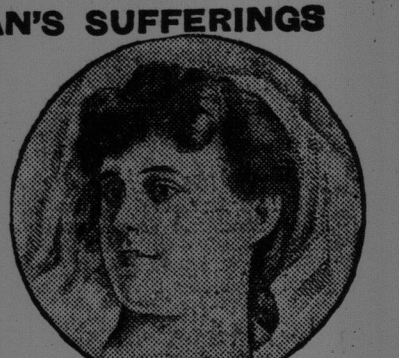

He ate a hearty breakfast in the morning and entered the examining officer's room and varied the charges against him that he will probably spend the rest of his life in goal even if he escapes the death penalty.

## DRAMA OF TWO GIRLS

One Found Drowned—The Other Missing.

London, April 20—A double mystery was created by the death of Mary Elizabeth Howe, 35, of Disraeli road, Harlesden, who was found drowned in the Grand Junction canal at Park Royal. Her friend, a girl of 17, who lived in the same street, was seen with her at the time of the tragedy, but has since disappeared. Some light may be thrown on the circumstances by a letter addressed by the dead girl to her mother, and found in the house after her death.

"I am writing this farewell letter to you, mother, to tell you that I am the black sheep of the family, and please tell Bill that I shall not go with him now, so he can go with other girls. Give my love to Jack Weymouth (a girl), and tell Ada Darvell that she can find a new address today for trial size, 10c. At the bottom of the canal finding fishes. From your unwanted daughter, Elizabeth."

The mother of the missing girl stated with great distress that she could not understand her daughter's disappearance, as she had always been happy at home, and was her favorite daughter.

## After 13 Years

Repentant Husband Reappears But Too Late

London, April 20—Death thwarted Francis William Holman, 67, in his desire for reconciliation with his wife and family, whom he left 13 years ago. Arriving at the house of a friend of the family in Gloucester place, Brighton, Holman announced his identity, and declared he had come to find his wife and four children, and seek their forgiveness and reconciliation. This intention was no sooner announced than he collapsed on the floor and died immediately. An insurance card, giving an address in George street, Stone house, Plymouth, was in his possession. At the inquest, medical evidence was given that death was probably due to excitement, although there were signs of old tubercular disease, and a rupture of the bloodvessels of the lungs. John Edward Holman, deceased son, stated that after he left his mother, who is living in Woburn place, Brighton, was aware that the father had returned to the town. His bill was retreating in accordance with the medical evidence.

## WANTED HIM BACK.

Unhappy Union of Widow and Widower

London, April 20—Acute domestic differences were unfurled to the magistrate's sittings in St. Mary's, Harry Blissett, a tailor's cutter, of Chandos avenue, Walthamstow, was summoned by his wife, Alice, who alleged he had deserted her. Complained a middle-aged woman, living at Empress avenue, South Chingford, mentioned that she was married in 1917. About seven months ago her husband left her and went to live with his sister. He had not since returned, and had not supported her. Mrs. Blissett agreed that when she was married she was a widow and defendant a widower. She had four grown-up sons, and he had a daughter. Mr. Stern—And is it not a fact that because you did not live happily together one of your sons told him to go or he would be put out? The wife—I asked one of my sons to "speak to him." Mr. Stern—He told him to go? The wife, in answer to other questions, admitted that she recently sold two houses for £1,000, and that she owned two other houses. She added—"I don't want money from him, I want him to come back and live happily with me." Mr. Stern—He says he has had enough. He won't come back. An order was made for defendant to pay his wife £2 a week, as she left the court she caught hold of his hand, but he pulled away and hurriedly left her.

## CHILD'S DEATH LEAP.

Climbed From Bed and Jumped Out of Window.

London, April 20—Put to bed and left alone, a 3½-year-old girl, Phyllis Mary Stevens of Deal, subsequently climbed through a lavatory window, and jumped twelve feet to the ground, with fatal results. She lived with her step-mother, named Woodruff, at Moy's House, it was stated at the inquest, and clambered out of bed in her absence. The little girl then jumped from the window. When her step-mother returned, about 8.30, they found her with next-door neighbors, suffering from severe injuries, and although a doctor was called the child succumbed to a verdict of "accidental death" was returned.

The coroner found a verdict of suicide whilst of unsound mind, and said he thought the girl was of rather a peculiar temperament.

## THE PERFECT DOCTOR.

Striking Testimony Is Paid to X-Ray Expert.

London, April 20—Dr. Irenée Bruce, radiologist at Charing Cross Hospital, who died at the early age of forty-four, was buried at Farnham.

Youth's Last Kiss Before Taking His Life.

London, April 20—After having taken his sweetheart to a dance, Wilfrid Chadwick, 19, of Stonecough, drowned himself in a canal. Ruth Hindley, 17, a cotton weaver, of Boothstown, stated that Chadwick took her to a dance on March 12. He accompanied her home, and while talking together, she called his attention to the approach of the last car. "I shall not wait the car again; I am fed up with living," he answered, and did not take the car. "He cried, got hold of me and kissed me, and would not let me go, and gave me a ring off his finger to keep," added witness in tears. She asked him what was the matter, and he repeated that he was "fed up" and was going to drown himself. She then left him, and nothing more was heard of him until his body was recovered from the canal. A married sister, with whom deceased lived, stated that his former employers had written letters to her and him about some money he had collected. The coroner remarked that he was of the opinion that fear of prosecution led Chadwick to take his life. He returned a verdict of "Felo-de-se."

## BACK TO THE FARM.

London, April 20—In order to resume the life of a working farmer, Lord Rodney has returned to Canada. When he relinquished his captaincy in the Dragoon two years ago he acquired the farm which is of 620 acres, and has not employed himself or superintendent. He has himself boiled night and day in the manual work, as well as in the management of the farm. "Everybody in Canada works," he declared, before sailing from Liverpool, "and I do the same." His lordship, who is 29, was accompanied by Lady Rodney and their two young children.

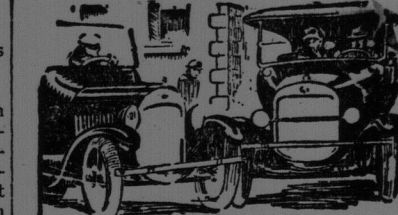
