HOPES TO GIVE DETROIT MODEL POLICE WOMEN
Miss V. M. Murray, Who Will Organize Force There, Discusses Her Plans. 12-15

Miss V. M. Murray, General Secretary of the Travelers' Aid Society, who has been appointed Director of the Women's Police Bureau of Detroit and who is to spend a year beginning Jan. 1, in organizing a woman police force there, while continuing her work in New York, believes conditions are ripe in Detroit to set a standard that will be an example for the entire country. 12-15

"I am thrilled at the opportunity," said Miss Murray to a New York Times reporter, "to do the work. Conditions seem to be favorable in Detroit to make it a great success. The Commissioner of Police, Dr. James W. Inches, is a physician and independent of his salary. The Mayor of Detroit is worth \$80,000,000 and the Citizens Committee is made up of representative and influential men. They seem to be keeping politics entirely out of the Police Department. They already have one splendid woman there, a Miss Davis, a graduate of Smith College, who has done much research work. In what I shall do I shall have the advice of such women as Miss Maude Miner and Mrs. Martha P. Faulkner, who was at Sleighton Farm, the Pennsylvania School for Delinquent Girls, who both are familiar with Detroit conditions. The women I shall call upon will all be socially trained and will range in age from 28 to 35. Our work will be constructive and we will emphasize the protective side of it as much as possible. We will work in the first place for an indeterminate sentence. They already have a physical clinic in Detroit, with voluntary workers, and we will start a mental clinic as soon as we can." 12-15

Miss Murray was first asked last October by the Detroit Police Commissioner, Dr. Inches, who had for two years been looking for the right woman, if she would leave the Travelers' Aid and come to Detroit. She refused, but being persuaded to go to Detroit and look over the ground, consented to organize the work, the title of Director of the Women's Police Bureau being conferred on her. She will spend ten days of each month in New York with the Travelers' Aid and perhaps more when the Detroit work is put on a firm footing. 12-15

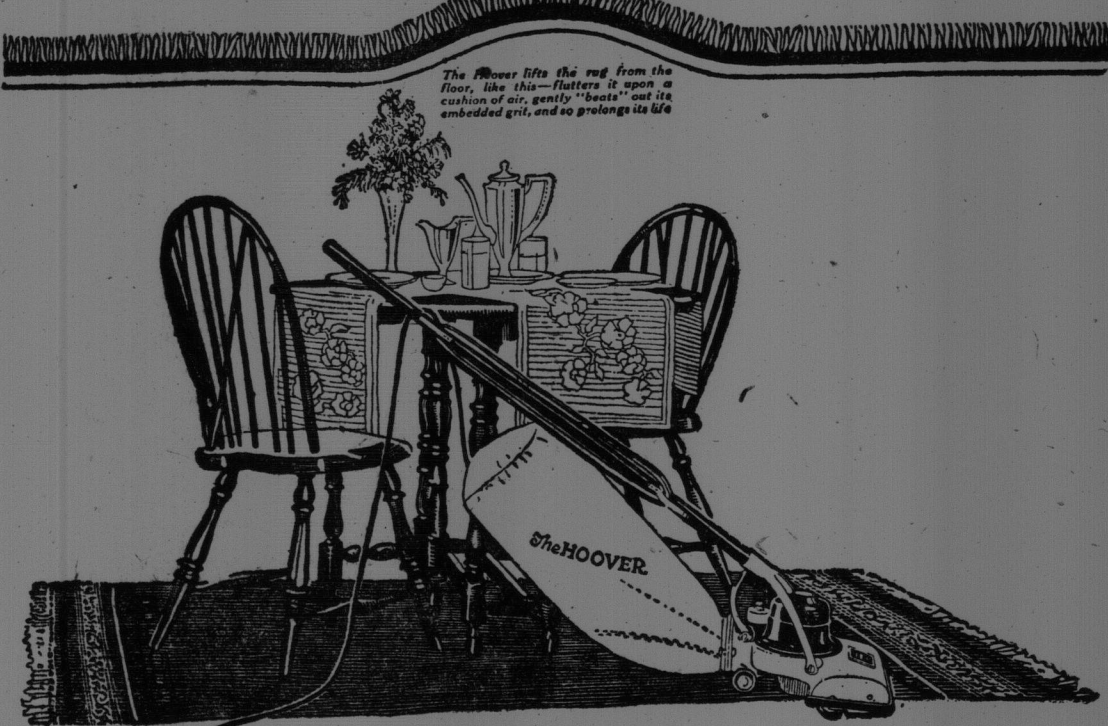

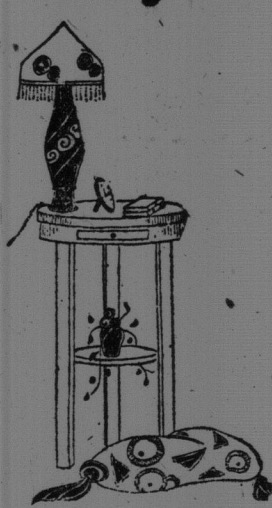

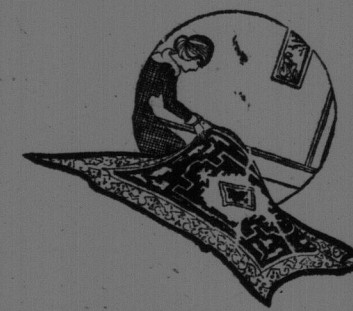
