# Barrel in City Today Men's Unde

Advance in Bakers' Bread Foreshadowed-Wheat Board Action Boosts Flour Price.

Despite the work of the board of commerce, the promises and assurances of investigators, the high cost of living took another ascension this morning when all grades of flour were advanced \$2.25 a barrel. This will bring the cost of a barrel of flour to more than \$15 to the average householder, while it will also mean an increase in the cost of bakers' loaves, just how much it is difficult to ascertain today. The increase came immediately upon the news of the action of the Canadian Wheat Board in ordering the government price to be increased fifty cents a bushel on Manitoba wheat, from \$2.30 to \$2,80.

An advance in the cost of bread was almost certain to have come soon after New Year's in St. John because of the recently enacted order that all loaves must be wrapped. One of the prominent bakers of the city said this morning that this could hardly be done at less than an extra cent in the cost of each loaf but that now with the jump in flour a great increase was certain to follow. 


