Flour Up \$2.25 a Barrel in City Today

Advance in Bakers' Bread Foreshadowed—Wheat Board Action Boosts Flour Price.

Despite the work of the board of commerce, the promises and assurances of investigators, the high cost of living took another ascension this morning when all grades of flour were advanced \$2.25 a barrel. This will bring the cost of a barrel of flour to more than \$15 to the average householder, while it will also mean an increase in the cost of bakers' loaves, just how much it is difficult to ascertain today. The increase came immediately upon the news of the action of the Canadian Wheat Board in ordering the government price to be increased fifty cents a bushel on Manitoba wheat, from \$2.30 to \$2.80.

An advance in the cost of bread was almost certain to have come soon after New Year's in St. John because of the recently enacted order that all loaves must be wrapped. One of the prominent bakers of the city said this morning that this could hardly be done at less than an extra cent in the cost of each loaf but that now with the jump in flour a great increase was certain to follow. Whether the increase will become effective at once or whether present stocks will first be exhausted is as yet unknown.

LOCAL NEWS

TURKEY CAME DOWN.
There were no turkeys at ninety cents a pound in the market on Saturday night. The price had dropped to sixty-five cents. Had this price been acceptable to the farmers and dealers a few days before Christmas the stock left on their hands would not have been so large.

DRESS FOR BALL.
It was announced at local military headquarters this morning, for the benefit of those who may be in doubt as to what dress the officers will wear at the artillery ball, that those who have the blue uniforms will wear them or if not the regular mess dress or khaki uniforms with Sam Brown belts and slacks.

TRADE INQUIRIES.
The board of trade has received an inquiry from Detroit regarding the dairy situation here. A Nova Scotia firm is asking about fruit dealers in the city and a letter from New York asks for the names of manufacturers of tarpaulins.

CITY ESTIMATES FOR 1920.
Mayor Hayes said this morning that he expected the estimates of expenditures by the various departments at city hall would be ready for presentation to the council about Jan. 10.

COMMITTEE MEETING.
The common council met in committee this morning at city hall with the mayor presiding and all the commissioners present with the exception of Mr. Thornton. No business was transacted and the meeting adjourned.

COMMISSIONERS TO SIT.
The board of railway commissioners will sit in Ottawa on Jan. 6 to take up the question of a revision of the charges on heated refrigerator cars. The new tariff calls for a charge of one and a half cents a mile in addition to the regular charge with a minimum of 82.

CONTRACTS AWARDED.
It was announced by Sheriff Wilson this morning that the contracts for the supplying of provisions and bedding to the county jail have been awarded to the following:—St. John Mercantile Company, groceries; J. M. Parlee, meats, and J. and W. Shaw, bedding.

HOME AGAIN.
Friends are greeting Dr. Joseph Donnelly very heartily upon his recent return from overseas. He came home the latter part of last week. Dr. Donnelly served with a medical unit on the other side, and since the armistice has been busy with the work of demobilization in England.

PRESENTATION.
One of the happy events of the Christmas season was the presentation of a purse of money to Rev. W. M. Duke by the Altar Society of St. Ann of the Cathedral. The presentation was made, on behalf of the membership, by Mrs. James Crow and Mrs. Annie Macneil.

CABLE IN ORDER AGAIN.
Complete repairs have been made to the cable across the harbor by the N. B. Telephone Company. The work was about finished on Saturday but final burying of the ends on shore took place today. People thought this morning that something more had happened to the cable because of a report that the west side service was out of order but it was merely a temporary suspension of the ringing power in Carleton, which was soon remedied.

SISTER LIVES HERE.
A special Frederickton despatch to the Times says that Mrs. Clara Hazlett, wife of John Hazlett of Nashwaakias, died this morning after a lingering illness. She is survived by her husband, one son, Roland, one daughter, Ethel, five sisters, Pearl Ross of St. John, Lillian Ross of Fredericton, Mrs. James Weston of Nashwaakias, Mrs. Chester Hazlett of Devon, and Mrs. Harrison Caughen of Fredericton, and two brothers, Henry Ross in the west, and Charles Ross of Devon.

ST. PAUL'S, ROTHESAY.
In St. Paul's church, ROTHESAY, yesterday, the Christmas services and special Christmas music were repeated and a large and appreciative congregation listened with pleasure to the solos, hymns and carols sung by the choir under the skillful direction of Mrs. G. N. Heywood, the organist.

At the morning service Rev. W. R. Hibbard, D. C. L., preached and there was a special Christmas service. The organist, Mrs. Heywood, played the Te Deum by Dykes, Pastoral Symphony by Handel, Adoration by Borowski, Christmas Offertorium, Lennins and Christmas Night by Gollis. The evening service was conducted by Rev. Canon A. W. Daniel, who preached an eloquent sermon. The Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis by Simpson was rendered, while Mr. Davidson and Mrs. Cannell sang a duet and Mrs. Walter Harrison a solo. Christmas carols were sung by the choir.

Fire Loss of \$150,000.
Watertown, N. Y., Dec. 29.—Fire last night destroyed the Sheldon block, in the heart of the business district and caused a loss estimated at \$150,000.

FORTY-FIVE ARRESTS IN LAST FEW DAYS

Nineteen on Bench in the Police Court This Morning on Various Charges.

Since Christmas eve forty-five prisoners have been gathered in by the police for various violations of the law, but in the most cases for the violation of the prohibition act. This morning as the magistrate stepped to the bench he was surrounded by nineteen men, including two prisoners, including both sexes, two colors, and natives of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Barbados. The prisoners' bench, which has accommodated the needs of St. John in this line for the last thirty years was too small this morning and it was necessary for some of the accused to be lined up on each side to await their turn of answering to charges preferred against them. The magistrate surveyed the crowd with his usual stern glance for a few minutes after which the clerk read out the names and the charges and as each answered the magistrate, with searching questions, was not long in finding out in each case what caused deviation from the "straight and narrow."

Two boys were charged with wandering about and not being able to give a satisfactory account of themselves in Ludlow street, West St. John, at 10.55 Saturday night. Policeman Gill said the two lads told him they were to meet a friend who lived in Brussels street, but after being closely questioned they both admitted they were not out to meet a friend but just to walk around. "It was a remarking on the recent habit of boys and even older people staying out late at night," the magistrate said. "It would be a silly old hen that would not gather her chickens in at dusk." This remark was made for the benefit of parents who allow their children in the streets at night. The lads were allowed to go on condition that they would keep off the streets at night.

John McGowan and John McCaustlin were charged with being drunk and also with having liquor in their possession other than their private dwelling. They pleaded guilty and were remanded. Allen Mason and Roland Parker were charged with being drunk and also with damaging a glass sign belonging to A. C. Smith and Company. They paid the damage which amounted to \$4 and a fine of \$8 each or two months in jail was imposed.

Charles Greary and Leo McCann were charged with wandering about and not being able to give a satisfactory account of themselves. A fine of \$8 each or two months in jail was imposed. Mack Fangel, aged twenty-five, and Finny Henne, aged thirty-one, colored men of Barbados, were charged with being drunk and fighting on Pettigall wharf. They were remanded. A woman, charged with being drunk and also with not being capable of taking care of her children, was remanded.

Eight men, charged with drunkenness were remanded to jail. Later one of the number was allowed to go on paying a fine of \$8.

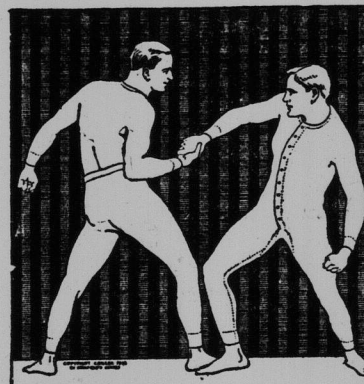

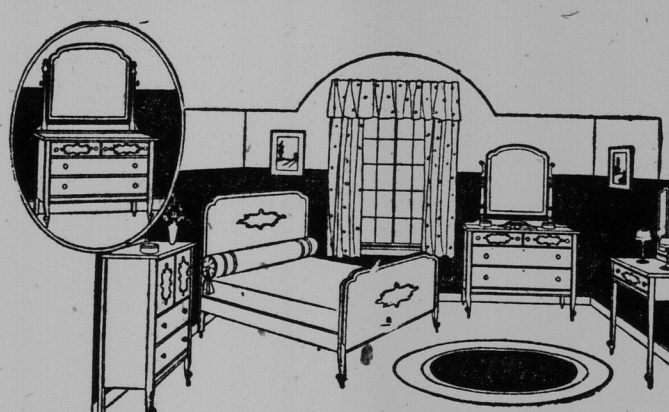
