Hide Supplies Increase. Supplies of cattle hides in the United States are reported to be ten per cent greater than a year ago, while calf skins show an increase of 21 per cent and kips of 100 per cent. As a consequence cattle hides in New York and Boston have declined four to seven cents since New Year's, and calf skins show a drop of \$1.25 to \$1.50 each.
