GERMAN PEACE BID TO BELGIUM USELESS

Foreign Minister of Plucky Nation Discusses the Matter

London, Sept. 19.—(By the Associated Press).—The Belgian foreign minister, in discussing Germany's "peace approach" to Belgium, declares that the conditions cannot be taken as a basis for any serious discussion. From the details furnished by the foreign minister, it appears that Belgium received no formal proposition directly from the German government, but that communications came by an indirect channel.

He showed that it was Germany's intention to demand that Belgium bind herself to effect a solution of the language question in conformity with the German policy, which Belgium would regard as an abdication of the right inherent in her sovereignty to solve internal problems in accordance with the freely expressed will of the Belgian people.

Germany would also claim full amnesty for Belgian citizens guilty of helping the enemy's plans, and would threaten, according to the minister, impose on the Belgian government an act of submission.

Germany would insist on the maintenance of the status quo in the commercial treaties previously in force. This following on the destruction of Belgium industry by the German army, would insure Germany's economic grip on the country. Moreover, he added, the peace theory is not obtainable, Germany would insist upon binding the fate of Belgium with the solution of the colonial question.

Finally, the obligation resting on Germany to repair the damage unjustly inflicted on its victim was not even alluded to. Germany, the minister points out, would thus be enriched by the pillage of Belgium, whose ruin would be complete.

CONGRESS FOR 21-2 P. C. BEER

Trades and Labor Parliament Discusses Matter and Carries Motion by Large Majority

Quebec, Sept. 20.—At the Trades and Labor Congress yesterday a short debate took place on a motion which sought to place the congress on record as approving of the action of the Ontario executive in urging Premier Hearst to allow beverages containing two and a half per cent of alcohol and requesting the dominion and provincial governments to make it legal to manufacture and sell anywhere in Canada any beverage not exceeding two and a half per cent of alcohol.

The motion was sponsored by John Young of Toronto.

John W. Bruce of Toronto opposed it. He contended that the arguments that more and stronger beer would increase the productivity of the workmen were wrong in logic and facts.

Mr. Young said they should have a proper beverage instead of the slops now served out.

Thomas Stevenson of Toronto said that there was nothing about the productivity of workmen in the resolution.

J. R. O'Leary of Toronto said that there were more blind pigs selling cheap whiskey now.

He thought the temperance element in Canada should follow the example of the prohibition party in the United States. Three per cent beer was allowed in Maine.

Gustav Franco of Montreal said he liked beer and intended to keep on drinking it. The present temperance beverages were worse than water.

Richard Lynch of Montreal said he had emptied several breweries and a couple of distilleries and was still alive.

He intended to stick to beer until he crossed the River Jordan.

T. C. Cassidy of Montreal said in England the working classes were allowed by the Lloyd George government just enough beer not to affect their productivity and enough to prevent them from thinking.

The motion was adopted by an overwhelming majority.
