## ELECTION CARDS

Ladies and Gentlemen:—

After the primary election in 1912, I issued a pamphlet of which the following is a copy:

It being absolutely impossible to call upon each and every one of you before April 23rd, I take this opportunity of again thanking you for the magnificent vote tendered me on April 9th. I wish you to know that your friendly manifestations on that date are esteemed at their full value, and I have accepted them with all the gratitude of which I am capable.

Throughout the campaign I have refrained from canvassing for or against any candidate, as I accuse no candidate of any other motive than a desire to do his public duty.

If elected, I shall do mine, and it will be the purpose of my administration to maintain authority, to enforce obedience to all the laws of the city; in the interests of the people, to demand a rigid economy in all the expenditures which should only be made upon public necessity. Wastefulness, profligacy, or favoritism in public expenditure is nothing short of criminal, but there is nothing in the condition of our city or of our people to suggest that anything presently necessary to the public prosperity, security or honor should be unduly postponed.

While a treasury surplus is not the greatest evil, it is a serious evil, but our revenue should be ample to meet the ordinary demands upon our treasury, with a sufficient margin for those extraordinary, but scarcely less imperative demands which arise now and then. As a high sense of duty and an ambition to improve the service should characterize each commissioner, I would require honest and faithful services of all the employees of any department. I might be elected to administer.

There are many ways in which the convenience and comfort of those who have business with our civic officials may be promoted by thoughtful and obliging officials, and I would expect those who occupy such positions to justify their selection by a conspicuous efficiency in the discharge of their duties.

The ideal, or even my own ideal, I would probably not attain. Respect for any department might be elected to administer.

The above copy is reprinted for the purpose of analyzing and comparing with my record as a commissioner for the last two years. It is the duty of each elector to properly weigh the statement made by me two years ago, when seeking your support, and the following questions are suggested for your consideration:

Has McLellan as commissioner of public works made an honest effort to maintain authority, enforce obedience to all the laws of the city, demand a rigid economy in all the expenditures, eliminate wastefulness, profligacy, or favoritism in public expenditure, and improve the different services in connection with his department?

If I have failed to do so, it is your right to know why, and if I cannot furnish a satisfactory reason for doing so, you will not be expected to extend to me any further support.
