Sulzer Impeached; Wife Says She Used the Money

Needed it For House and Took Chance in Wall Street

Albany, Aug. 13.—William Sulzer, governor of New York, was impeached by the lower house of the legislature at 6:15 o'clock this morning, after an all-night session, by a vote of seventy-nine to forty-five on charges of having diverted campaign contributions to his private use and having made, under oath, false statements as to his campaign receipts.

What attitude Governor Sulzer would take in this matter, regarding the question of accepting his resignation, was the subject of a press conference held here today. The majority leaders were reasonably certain, they say, that he would not attempt to continue to hold office, but would recognize what he called the law, and give way to Louis Marshall, the governor's counsel, who is expected to be sworn in tomorrow.

MORE THAN 3,000 REBELS KILLED IN TORREON DEFEAT
