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FRENCH LEGISLATION TO PREVENT STRIKES

Paris, Dec. 22—The text of the government measures formulated for the purpose of preventing general strikes, with particular reference to the employees of public service corporations, was made public tonight.

The measures constitute a comprehensive plan for ending the strike evil on the railways and in other public services by means of a compulsory conciliation commission, composed of representatives of the men and companies. This commission will meet at regular intervals, and when conciliation fails, compulsory arbitration is provided for, the principle being introduced that where the arbitral sentence imposes an additional charge, the corporation can indicate the method whereby the railroad or public service can secure for him to get either by raising the rate or by other means.

LUDLOW STREET CHURCH

To the Editor of The Times: Sir,—In reference to the article re execution of Rev. V. B. Robinson, published in your paper of yesterday, I have this to say:

That previous to, and throughout this investigation Mr. Robinson has shown a decided spirit of persistence and unfair prejudice against my daughter; this apparently because she disliked him and disapproved of his methods and conduct, and was not afraid to say so. My order for him to get a complete vindication from something he feared, it was evident that he must have someone to condemn. To do this he selected as an instrument the one person who seemed to have made most of the so-called statements, and by threats of legal proceedings frightened her into making extravagant statements which are held as evidence against my daughter, who are innocent of the charges so made.

The committee meetings held prior to the church meeting were so managed by Mr. Robinson that only such evidence as suited his case was allowed to be given. The result of all this came last night when the resolution as published in The Telegraph, containing two distinct items, was put before the meeting in combined form, with discussion of the same prohibited, and although vigorously protested, was carried. I am fully satisfied that only a limited number are fully aware of the facts of the case, and that those who did vote did not understand that they were voting on both questions at once, until it was proclaimed they had done so.

I hereby protest that the whole matter as carried out is a gross injustice to innocent and consistent members of the Ludlow street church. I would further add that at an early stage in the above named difficulties, the matter was referred to a committee of clergymen of the denomination with a view to having it settled quietly by them. This in a kindly and Christian manner they consented to do. All these gentlemen very earnestly urged Mr. Robinson to agree to their intervention, but he obstinately refused to consent, and preferred to man the boat in his own way as he has all along persisted in doing. It must now be carried before the regular denominational tribunal, where it will consider the independent and unbiased review of the best authorities in our church life.
