
WORLD-WIDE RADIO SOON TO FLASH WORDS TO ARGENTINA

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 8.—(By Mail).—The big, high powered wireless station at Monte Grande, near Buenos Ayres, the first South American station in the international commercial radio system, is almost completed, and it is announced that service will begin in June or July next. It will place Argentina in direct wireless communication with the United States for the first time, as well as with Europe.

Radio engineers say there are two strange, static "dead areas," one near the equator of Brazil, and one in the South Atlantic, which only a station equipped like that at Monte Grande can overcome.

The new station has been built entirely with American materials. All that remains unfinished are the control lines from Monte Grande into the city, a distance of twenty-four kilometers, which will be placed in underground conduits leading to the company's office in the business center.

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UPKEEP OF A WAX MODEL

IS ALMOST \$500 A YEAR

Hairdresser and Manicurist Are Among Those Employed to Care for Figure.

London, Feb. 25.—(By Mail).—Most London shoppers are familiar with the wax models in the windows of an Oxford circus establishment, but one may venture to say that there are few who have any idea of the mysteries of their toilet and of the expense of their upkeep, comments The Westminster Gazette.

Each figure costs about £70 or £80, and some are models of living people, including Fay Compton and the French actress, Mistinguette. Each week a coiffeur dresses and waves their hair, and a special staff is employed to wash them in turpentine, manure their nails and "make them up" with rouge and pencil.

Their latest use has been to display lingerie for the winter sale. It seems that fashion has been less capricious than in her wont, and her dictates for this year are simple—longer skirts, higher hats and lower heels. There was a rumor that she was inclining toward gray hair, but this is generally disbelieved.

FAMILY LOSES 4 CHILDREN.

Three Buried in One Grave.—Fifth is ill.—Mother Collapses.

Camden, N. J., March 15.—Four young children of Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Sharpley here have died within the last few days and a fifth is ill.

Harry, 3 years old, contracted a cold and died in the Municipal Hospital. Catherine, the two-year-old daughter, contracted diphtheria and died. Margaret, 1 year old, and Margaret's twin brother, Robert, also died in the hospital.

Another child, George, 6 years old, is dangerously ill. The bodies of the three children were buried in one grave. The mother of the children collapsed.

DEBATE IN STONE CHURCH.

An interesting debate took place last night in the parish hall of St. John's (Stone) church, under the auspices of the Men's Club. The subject was "Resolved, That a diplomatic representative from Canada should be sent to Washington." The affirmative was supported by Douglas McKean and Norman Merritt, and R. W. Seely and Harold Baldwin represented the negative. The debate was keenly argued and strong reasons for their side of the case were advanced by both teams. The judges decided in favor of the affirmative by a two to one vote, L. P. D. Tiller, K. C., and George Warwick being of the opinion that they had won, while Hon. J. R. Armstrong dissented. The debate, which was open to the ladies as well attended.
