EVANGELIST GONE

But His Good Work Will go on After Him.

Park Street Methodist Church Crowded at Mr. Ostrom's Farewell Meetings.

Rev. Henry Ostrom's meetings in Park St. Methodist church on Saturday afternoon and evening, were well attended.

On Sunday morning a general rally was held in the church from 9.30 to 11 o'clock, Rev. E. N. Baker conducting the services and J. P. Hillis the singing. Many renewed their consecration to God.

Rev. Mr. Ostrom, in the S. S. hall talked to the Sunday school teachers, officers and workers during the same time, from which much benefit will be derived.

At 11 a. m., the evangelist conducted the services in the church, and it was well filled. His sermon was on "Love," and was ably handled by the reverend gentleman.

In the afternoon a mass meeting was held and was crowded, both Mr. Ostrom and Mr. Baker taking part, and Mr. Hillis singing at intervals in his usual good style.

TO A CROWDED CHURCH.

In the evening the church was filled to the doors, chairs having to be put in aisles in order to seat the vast crowd. Rev. Mr. Ostrom took for his text 55th chapter of Isaiah, and 13th verse, "In-stead of the thorn shall come up the fir tree, and instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle tree; and it shall be to the Lord for a name for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off." Evangelist Ostrom drew some valuable lessons for everyday life from this verse, and was listened to throughout with great attention. There are a great many men who would become Christians, said Mr. Ostrom, if they were professing Christians would come over on the Lord's side to-night, when many more to their feet and promised to follow in his footsteps.

Rev. Mr. Ostrom had been asked to stop a few days longer, but it was impossible, as his meetings in Nebraska had been postponed to enable him to come over on the Lord's side to-night. He stated that the Rev. Mr. Baker had seen him in London, and wanted him to come to Chatham, and knowing Mr. Baker so well, he could hardly say no, as he knew what a worker Mr. Baker was.

Rev. Mr. Baker, on behalf of the congregation, thanked Messrs. Ostrom and Hillis for coming to Chatham.

Mr. Ostrom then thanked the people for the courtesy shown him, and Mr. Hillis said while in our city that they were used just like one of the families where they were stopping. They would leave for Nebraska on Monday morning, and wished Brother Baker and his congregation success.

Meetings will be held to-night, Wednesday and Friday, by Rev. Mr. Baker, when he hopes that good results will follow.

PUMPING TROUBLE

Commissioner Johnston Gives His Side of It.

Will Be Responsible For Both Pumps On the Forbes' Scheme or Neither.

To The Planet.—Please allow me space in your valuable paper to correct the grievances which were moved by Mr. Fletcher and seconded by Mr. Campbell, that on account of complaints made by Silas Roadhouse, re John E. Brooks, that the reeve be instructed to ascertain whether the pumps are being run to the best interest of the ratepayers on the Forbes' works and if not to take such steps to make the scheme efficient.—Carried.

Now I think that Mr. Fletcher and Mr. Campbell must have been wrongly informed when they made this move, for the reeve should have informed them differently as he saw the Forbes' works and measured up Mr. Roadhouse's wood, and found the plains perfectly dry especially the lowest lands.

The same day I went down with the reeve and showed him where the water was dammed back at the railroad bridge in the St. Clair district, and I explained to the reeve that if there were forty pumps pumping below that they could not drain Mr. Roadhouse's land until they cleaned under the railroad bridge.

That Mr. Roadhouse had a job in 1897 which is not commenced yet of cleaning this out. Until this was done the land above the railroad bridge could not get any better drainage, and the low land in the plains would be overflowed over three feet before it could hurt Mr. Roadhouse. I also explained the matter to the council at last meeting. pay taxes on the following:—Lots 1 of 15 in the fourth, 1.8 in the third, 1.2 in the third, a hf of 1.13 in the third. All of which is over three feet lower than Mr. Roadhouse's, so you can see that there was no room for complaint.

The same man made complaint to the reeve last year on the same lot—1.8 in the fifth—and the reeve gave him an order to have No. 2 pump run, which cost me a great deal of trouble and expense. I think that the reeve should have consulted me about it.

I found No. 2 pump running and went out and stopped it, and No. 1 had been pumping at the same time and there was not water enough for the one lot alone two.

Next morning I went out to the reeve and found him at breakfast and wanted him to come and see whether the water was up on the land or not, and asked him how he gave an order to Mr. Roadhouse to pump. I told him at the time that I took the commission business that neither the council nor reeve were to interfere with my work, and that I would not act upon any other grounds, and that he should have sent the order to me.

I will now explain to you why I will not act as commissioner when the council interferes: When I was appointed commissioner in 1896 there was only one pump, then there was two pumps in keeping the plains dry. Later on they got the second pump; then the trouble and jealousy commenced.

See Peter County to run No. 2 pump.
