Within the past fortnight twenty-three housemadds and cooks have killed themselves on account of unrequited affection twelve of them by drowning in the waters of the Spree. An official at police headquarters in explaining the circumstance said:

When they depart for their homes they leave behind scores of broken hearts and numerous unfilled promises of marriage.
