

The plaintiff alleged that above statements were false; that they were material, and that it was principally on the strength of them in the prospectus which was shown to him by Mr. Sharpe that he purchased the stock.

The defendants in their pleadings, Mr. Manchester and Mr. Elkin, answering under oath, set out that the paid up capital, which was then about \$45,000, was virtually owned by the directors, and that there was some understanding that they would increase their holdings if more money were needed after the \$20,000 worth of stock were disposed of. They alleged that although some \$15,000 of stock was owned outside of the company, yet it was the property of the estate of the late George F. Baird, and that Mr. Baird was in his lifetime a director of the company.

Mr. Farrell in January 1904 obtained

Mr. Farrell in January, 1904, obtained information which led him to believe that false representations had been made to him. Within a few days he repudiated his stock, and demanded back his money. Considerable correspondence and some personal interviews took place between him and Mr. Manchester and Mr. Elkin Mr. Elkin denied that he or Mr. Manchester had employed Mr. Sharpe, On April 13th, 1904, Mr. Manchester, as president of the company, wrote a letter to Mr. Farrell, in which it was stated that the conditions under which he (Farrell) had bought the stock had not been changed. They also denied having any knowledge of the prospectus. The plaintiff issued a writ on Dec. 22, 1904, and the case was tried before Chief Justice Barker, sitting in equity in April, 1907.

The plaintiff relied mainly upon present and former officials of the dompany for evidence to make out his case. The most material witness for the plaintiff was Eben Perkins, at one time superintendent of the defendant company. He was examined in January, 1907, before commissioners in Hoopeston, near Chicago, J. M. Price attending the examination on behalf of the plaintiff and M. G. Teed, K. C. on behalf of the defendants.
