

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

HURD PETERS, FOR MANY YEARS CITY ENGINEER, IS DEAD AT AGE OF 78 YEARS

The deceased was born at Frederiction, N. B., August 28, 1831, having completed almost seveny-nine years of life. He was the son of Hon. Charles Jeffrey and Mary Ann Elizabeth (Formes) Peters. He came of Loyalist stock, his grandfather, John Peters, having settling in this province in 1783. The family was established in America by Charles Peters, a physician, who took up his residence in New York in 1703. In New Brunswick the Peters family was established first at St. John, afterward at Gagetown.
