COTTON SHIPS.—We find by reference to the books kept by Mr. Court, in the Underwriters' rooms that the following vessels were employed in transporting the last crop of cotton (from September, 1844) to Liverpool, viz.:—At New Orleans, 9 British vessels loaded, of which one was lost; 154 American vessels loaded, of which three were lost and one has yet to arrive. At Mobile, 10 British vessels loaded, and one was lost; 9 British and 2 American vessels loaded. At Apalachee, 45 British and 46 American vessels loaded. At Savannah, 47 British and 46 American vessels loaded. At Charleston, 43 British and 83 American vessels loaded. Total, 254 British and 361 American vessels.
