HARVARD'S RETIRING HEAD TELLS OF NEW RELIGION

Dr. Eliot in Address Before Summer School of Theology Speaks of a Dawning Faith Based Upon Authority and the Gospel of Joy and Life—How Religion Eliminates Supernatural Elements and is Bound Only by Laws of Nature A Religion of "All Saints."

Cambridge, Mass., July 22.—Chas. W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard University, prophesied the advent of a new religion in an address before the Harvard Summer School of Theology this afternoon.

ings and the faith will not be radical or tribal. "The new religion will not teach that character can be changed quickly; it will admit neither a sudden conversion in this world or a sudden paradise in the next. The Christian Church has substituted for human sacrifices the burning of incense. It will be of immense advantage if the religion of the twentieth century shall get rid of these things, for they give a wrong conception of God. The new religion will not think of God as a large and glorified man or king or patriarch; it will not deal chiefly with sorrow and death, but with joy and life. It will believe in no malignant powers and it will attack quickly all forms of evil.
