# FARM LABORS ARE NEEDED IN CANADA

## Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of Interior, Deals with Warning of Dominion Trades and Labor Congress.

Ottawa, July 24.—Hon. Dr. Roche, minister of the interior, stated today that though there is much wisdom on the part of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress in warning prospective emigrants in Great Britain against coming to the cities of Canada unless they have positions waiting for them, he believes that there is still a demand for farm laborers all over the country.  
Dr. Roche emphasized that every immigration agent in Great Britain had received instructions to rather discourage any immigrants not having positions awaiting them from coming to the cities of this country. In all the literature published by the Department of the Interior and circulated freely in the old country the following warning is printed in bold type: "Important! Farm laborers, farmers and female domestic servants are the only people whom the Canadian immigration department advises to go to Canada. All others should get definite assurance of employment before leaving home, and have money enough to support them for a time in case of disappointment."

# WOMAN RIDDEN ON RAIL

## MRS. JOHN H. RICHARDSON

Sixteen women of Yolo, Ill., a village near Chicago, are tremblingly awaiting arrest for riding Mrs. John H. Richardson on a rail and dumping her into a mud puddle on the outskirts of the town. Warrants will be issued for the arrest of the sixteen women.  
Mrs. Richardson, made ill by the shock of her experience, declares she will prosecute her assailants vigorously. "They are idle gossips," she said. "Their statement that I neglected my household duties and left my crippled husband at home alone while I went driving with Will Dammill, my brother-in-law, is a wicked falsehood."  
"I always attended to my household duties and minded my own affairs, while they passed the most of their time playing cards and gossiping. I know them all and I shall prosecute them to the full extent of the law."

# DOUKHOBOERS WANT BIG SUM FOR OLD LAND

## Request Government for Half a Million Dollars for Farms they Abandoned in Saskatchewan.

Ottawa, Ont., July 24.—Asking for half a million dollars for the land in Saskatchewan which the Doukhobores abandoned when they moved to British Columbia, and bought new lands outright, rather than swear allegiance to the King, three representatives of the colony are in Ottawa to see the Minister of the Interior. Because, owing to religious stipulations, they could not become Canadian citizens, one of the party told the eastern press, the people of the strange sect about four years ago had to leave their homesteads in Saskatchewan and go to the coast province, where they purchased land outright, thus rendering it unnecessary to pledge allegiance to the sovereign.  
They have done wonderfully well in the fruit-raising business in British Columbia, where about five thousand of them reside. There are about three thousand in Saskatchewan, who who will ultimately join the newer colony.  
Doukhobores belong to the Universal Brotherhood of Man and cannot give allegiance to any country, but they are good citizens and have not given the government any trouble for some years, said A. N. Evalenko of Verigin, Sask., one of the party.

# PRESIDENT MADERO SLAIN IN BED AS HE SLEPT

"Who accepts General Huerta accepts his acts."  
This was the comment of Mrs. Francisco Madero, wife of the late President of Mexico, upon the efforts of Provisional President Huerta to obtain recognition for his government by the United States.  
Mrs. Madero charges that her husband was slain in his bed in the National Palace in Mexico City, where he was being transferred to the penitentiary. She substantiates her belief by photographs showing her husband's clothes in the room in which he was imprisoned.

# CHILD DEATH OF CHILDREN

## Three Bitten by Rattle Snakes and Baby Falls into Creek and Drowns—Mother Prostrated.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 24.—Three children of Mr. and Mrs. John Cooper of Knoxville, Tenn., were fatally bitten by rattlesnakes late yesterday and while Mrs. Cooper sought for them, an infant she had placed near the bank of a stream fell into the water and was drowned. Funeral services for the four children took place today.

## Damage Estimated in Neighborhood of \$100,000—Communication is Suspended.
