



Yarmouth, N. S., April 13.-The heavy storm of the past twenty-four hours has played havoc with the lob-ter fishermen all along the shore. The men have just got their gear out of the spring fishing, many of them having done nothing since their traps were washed away in the heavy gale which was responsible for the loss of the steamer Cobequid. At yarmouth the bar alone where there are thirty boats fishing, there are a thousand traps on the shore. At the least estimate? It is safe to say that among the hundreds of boats on this shore the proportion of the loss is about the same, that is thirty to forty traps per boat.


