JESS WILLARD HAILED  
AS SAVIOUR OF GAME

Jess Willard's triumph over Jack Johnson several days ago has proved the salvation of the pugilistic game. The sport was in a mendicant state until Willard came along and revolutionized the entire pastime with a pile-driving right to Johnson's chin.

Had the hairy negro tumbled the giant Kansas to defeat as easily as he had Willard's predecessors, the deteriorating game would surely have landed in the dumps. We would have thought that the trade of "white hoping" was at an end; and this brigade helped sustain interest in the boxing games.

One thing we can assure the reader—there will never be a black heavyweight champion, or a colored champion in any division for that matter, at least as long as the present generation endures. The Ethiopian has been eliminated from every competitive class, Johnson being the last of his race to be wiped out.

Classes are clear. There hasn't been a colored featherweight of calibre since George Dixon passed away; there hasn't been a ranking ebony lightweight since the demise of Joe Gans, the last good colored welterweight passed with the retirement of Joe Walcott, and there hasn't been a capable dusky middleweight since Sam Langford graduated into the heavyweight division.

There are a few ponderous colored heavyweights, any one of whom could give Willard a hard battle, but they must mingle among themselves hereafter. They mustn't play with the paleface boys any more.

A ST. PAUL  
BOXING BILL  
LEGALIZED

St. Paul, Minn., April 25.—Governor Hammond yesterday signed the boxing bill legalizing ten-round, no decision, boxing matches in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth. Under the provisions of the law, which become immediately effective, only twelve bouts may be staged in one year in any one of the three cities.

Even before he tackled Johnson, the new champion made it clear that he would never mingle with a negro in the ring again. So it will be a merry scrap among the white lads to determine who shall be the first to try out the wares of the new titleholder.
