## JESS WILLARD HAILED AS SAVIOUR OF GAME

Jess Willard's triumph over Jack Johnson several days ago has proved the salvation of the pugilistic game. The sport was in a mendicant state until Willard came along and revolutionized the entire pastime with a pile-driving right to Johnson's chin. Had the hairy negro tumbled the giant Kansas to defeat as easily as he had Willard's predecessors, the deteriorating game would surely have landed in the dumps. We would have thought that the trade of "white hoping" was at an end; and this brigade helped sustain interest in the boxing games.

One thing we can assure the reader—there will never be a black heavy-weight champion, or a colored champion in any division for that matter, at least as long as the present generation endures. The Ethiopian has been eliminated from every competitive class, Johnson being the last of his race to be wiped out.

**Classes are Clear.**  
There hasn't been a colored featherweight of calibre since George Dixon passed away; there hasn't been a ranking ebon lightweight since the demise of Joe Gans, the last good colored welterweight passed with the retirement of Joe Walcott, and there hasn't been a capable dusky middleweight since Sam Langford graduated into the heavyweight division. There are a few ponderous colored heavyweights, any one of whom could give Willard a hard battle, but they must mingle among themselves hereafter. They mustn't play with the paleface boys any more.

The day of the colored pugilist has gone, never to thrive again. Johnson

will never fight again, for the simple reason that he is detroned and broken in spirit, and would prove easy for a mediocre "white hope" now. There will be no mad scramble among promoters for Johnson's services, and the former champion should be content with living peacefully on his chicken farm near Paris.

**A New Idol.**  
A few weeks ago Johnson was champion of the universe; now he is a middle-aged negro, sapped of his strength, shorn of his power, with his source of income completely cut off. Willard, the gawky copperncher from Kansas, is the idol of the pugilistic world, and already has begun realizing on his new acquired championship. He richly deserves whatever he can accrue from being the titleholder, for he strove valiantly to gain possession of the crown. Any other heavy weight would have become disheartened and abandoned the task after the first few setbacks. But not Willard. He plodded along indolently and now he is reaping his reward.

Many ugly rumors of "fake" have followed in the trail of the Willard. Johnson affair, but as yet nothing has been proved to show it was a pre-arranged affair. Willard is the champion, and will continue in that capacity for several years.

**Hikes to the Stage.**  
It is hardly likely that Willard will engage in a ring fight again for at least a year. He can get theatrical booking for half a year, and the other half he will spend in flaunting his championship in the faces of those who derided him when he was a mere "white hope," with no prospects of becoming champion.

## A ST. PAUL BOXING BILL LEGALIZED

St. Paul, Minn., April 25.—Governor Hammond yesterday signed the boxing bill legalizing ten-round, no decision, boxing matches in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth. Under the provisions of the law, which become immediately effective, only twelve bouts may be staged in one year in any one of the three cities.
