PROSPECTS FOR **MORE MUNITIONS** ORDERS BRIGHT

Big Battle Now in Progress at Verdun Should Create Demand for Shells.

PLANTS HAVE WORK FOR MONTHS YET

Munitions Makers in Canada Said to be Organizing to Ask New War Orders from British Gov't,

tendering direct to the British authorities.

At the present time every Canadian munition maker has sufficient orders on his books to keep his plants going to capacity for some months. In addition the large demands for locomotives and cars for the Russians, the demand for building material such as portable houses for the refugee French and Belgians continues to keep Canadian factories working to capacity. There is a feeling, however, that a special effort should be made to secure additional shell contracts. The activities of the Germans at Verdun and the expected tremendous demand for shells when the Allies start their spring drive has aroused the Canadian munition makers and from now on, there will be a brisk demand for everything our manufacturers can turn out. The war is by no means over. (Journal of Commerce.)
