

EIGHT CRIMINAL CASES ON DOCKET IN NORTHUMBERLAND

County Court Opens July Sitting, Judge McLatchy Presiding—Several Civil Suits.

Newcastle, July 26.—County Court opened yesterday, His Honor Judge McLatchy presiding.

The grand jury were: Councillor G. P. Burchill, foreman; Councillor J. W. Vandenberg, Howard Williston, Peter Archer, J. K. Brea, D. S. Creighton, James Lamont, Robert Irving and James D. Johnston, three of the twelve called being absent.

In his charge to the grand jury His Honor said he was sorry to find so many criminal cases before him, eight being the largest number he had ever had in this county, yet it was only a wave, as the county had for years been fairly free from crime.

His Honor reviewed the docket. 1. King vs. Millett Stewart, a charge of assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm. A dispute had arisen over an interest in undivided property bought by Wm. G. Gay, who had taken steps to build thereon. It appeared that Stewart had warned Gay off the premises, which he himself claimed. Gay directed him to the law. Stewart returned, and in a second altercation, struck Gay over the head and again over the wrists with a stick. Some claimed that Stewart was in actual possession at the time, some that he was not.

2. King vs. John Fleming, charged with assault upon Arthur Carrier. It appeared that Carrier, with several others, had been playing a bowling game. Fleming came in and wanted to play with him. An altercation followed. No one seemed to have been hurt. Carrier claims Fleming kicked him in the face, and Carrier was found with face bruised, eye closed, etc.

3. King vs. S. Randle, charged with theft of money from Thomas Flynn. Pursue and receipt were identified by Flynn, and a large sum of money was found.

4 and 5. King vs. Casey and M. Randle, charged with taking gloves, lap robes, horse collars, etc. to value of \$22.85 from Geo. M. Lake's store.

8. King vs. E. McDonald, charged with receiving stolen goods.

There are several civil suits: Milton Ames vs. Chas. Mitchell, asking damages for taking and converting plaintiff's goods. Hon. L. J. Tweedie for plaintiff; A. A. Davidson for defendant.

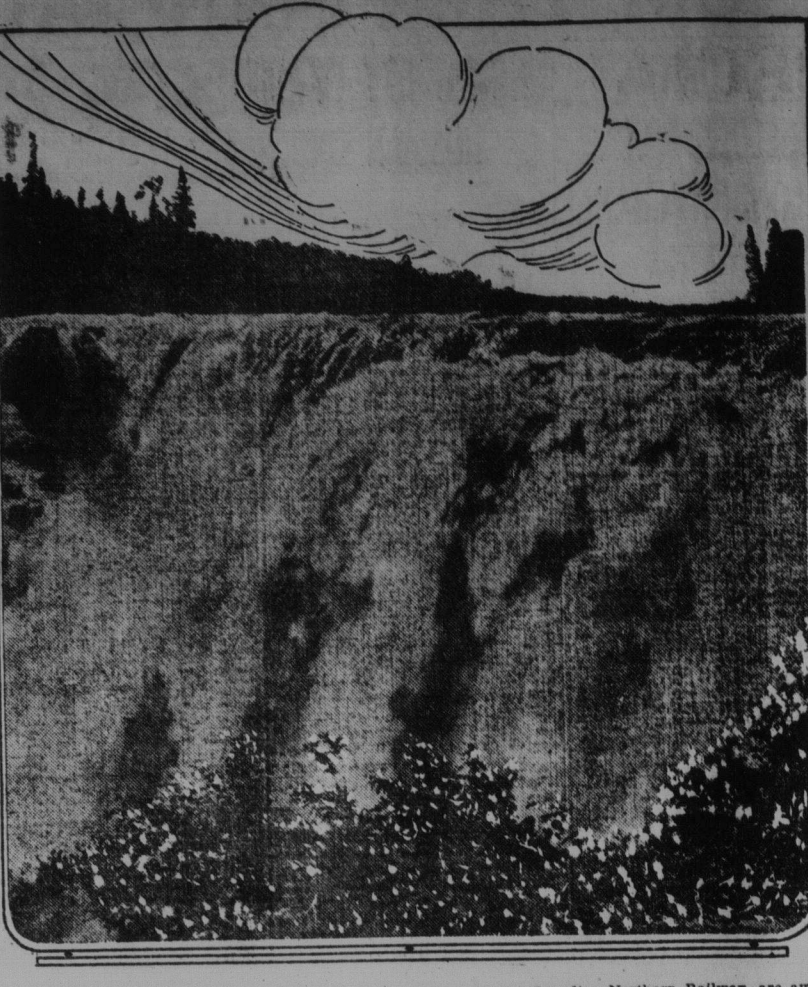

Kakabeka Falls of the Kammistiquia



Kakabeka Falls, twenty-two miles west of Port Arthur on the Canadian Northern Railway, are among the most beautiful in Canada. While not so high as the Montmorency, near Quebec, the volume of water is greater. The Kammistiquia River drops over a ledge some two hundred feet in width, a distance of one hundred and ten feet and the gorge below is half a mile or more in length.

For many years the Kammistiquia formed part of the canoe route used by the Hudson Bay Company men between Lake Superior and the great Central Plains. The first attempt to create a practical line of communication was when the historic Dawson Trail was constructed. That trail connected the various rivers and lakes between Prince Arthur's Landing, now Port Arthur, and Winnipeg, and was a feature of west to suppress the first Riel Rebellion, the troops were moved in boats which were laboriously dragged around the Falls. The steel highway followed it closely for two hundred and fifty miles.

An interesting trip in former times, and one still quite practicable, is to take a canoe by train to Kakabeka station and run the river, poraging past the Falls on the way down. The long stretch of rapids below makes for a trip exciting but not dangerous, and some of the views are beautiful. Guides who know the river and who can handle the canoe may probably be obtained at the Indian Mission, Squaw Bay.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres; extra cultivation, pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
